Albert Wong Lieutenant-Commander

ieutenant-Commander Albert Wong has had over thirty-five years of service as an officer in the Canadian Forces. He was the lead public affairs officer in handling the fallout from the Canadian Forces deployment to Somalia and was also relied upon to manage the public affairs aspects of crises with significant public and political attention, such as the inquiry into the catastrophic fire on board the submarine HMCS Chicoutimi.

Lieutenant-Commander Wong also has extensive public affairs experience at the international level. In 2000, he served as the military spokesperson for the United Nations Peacekeeping Mission in Ethiopia and Eritrea (UNMEE). He was then assigned to serve as the public affairs advisor to the Multinational Stand-by Forces High Readiness Brigade for UN Peacekeeping Operations from 2001 to 2004. Based in Copenhagen, he assisted the United Nations Headquarters in New York in planning UN missions in Liberia, Ivory Coast and the Sudan.

In September 2005, Lieutenant-Commander Wong served as the Strategic Communications Advisor to assist the Government of Afghanistan in the development of human capacity at various central government agencies and ministries in Afghanistan.

Retiring from the regular force in December 2009, Lieutenant-Commander Wong continues to serve as a Public Affairs Officer in the reserve



force and was appointed Chief Aide-de-Camp to the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario in April 2013.

Albert started AKW Global Enterprises, a Public Affairs consulting firm specializing in strategic communications, stakeholder relations, and issues of national security and emergency management. Albert is also a partner with CLUES, a company offering web-based personality assessment, advice and direction to students, families, professionals and businesses.

Lieutenant Commander Wong was awarded the 2012 Chinese Canadian Legend Award in recognition of his career in the Canadian Forces and his contribution to the Chinese Canadian community in Canada.


Part of the mystery to me was how on earth



Recently, Barb Alderson and I plus three other ladies from the Milton area went on a River Cruise on the Danube. For those of you who have considered a cruise, it is an excellent way to travel, as you glide along the river and are able to see all the sights as you pass. You also stop at many interesting places.

Our trip started in Sofia, Bulgaria, where we spent a couple of days sightseeing, which included dinner at a local restaurant and a live folk show. Then it was off to Vidin to pick up our boat, the Amadeus Brilliant. From there we travelled through the Iron Gate Gorge. Unfortunately, the weather was not too kind to us as it was a little misty but it was fascinating to see how close we were to either side of the river watching the storm thunder through the gap.

Our next stop was Belgrade in Serbia, then on to Pecs (pronounced Pesh) and Budapest in Hungary. In Budapest we visited a local market, which is somewhat like the St. Lawrence Market in Toronto. The first floor was for produce, meats, etc. and the second floor was for crafts. It really was something. On leaving Budapest, it was quite a sight to see the lights of the city. Spectacular!

Bratislava in Slovakia was our next stop and then it was on to Vienna in Austria. It was amazing that in St. Stephen's Square I heard someone calling my name and who should I see but 2 friends from Mississauga. It really is a small world!

From there we passed through the Wachau

Valley which is one of the finest landscapes in all Europe.

Passau, Germany was our last stop on the river. The weather, up until this time, had been quite good, but in Passau we had lots of rain and this continued on our journey by bus to Prague in the Czech Republic. It was rather cool in Prague too, but a very lovely city.

The architecture during the trip was so

different from anything that I had seen in other parts of Europe, with fantastic steeples on the churches and very elaborate castles. The TV pictures are nothing compared to actually seeing them.

I think the highlight of my trip was the visit to the Jewish Quarter in Prague, particularly a special synagogue that has been built to commemorate the Jews from Prague who were murdered during World War II. Their names, dates of birth and death (if known) were recorded on the walls of the synagogue. It was very touching to realize that these were just a few of the people who actually died in the concentration camps.

Many of the places we visited were recovering from the Communist regime. Some have advanced reasonably quickly, but others are a little slower. I would definitely recommend such a trip.


ix members of the Inklings Writing Club gathered to share their writings on November 27th.



relationship remained in her memory, the first stirrings of innocent love proving to be a






June Leach was an enthusiastic audience and will be presenting at the next meeting.
