



There was some interest in going to see the movie, based on the book, that was recently made. This book lead to discussions of many other books set at the same time such as "The Boy in the


Striped Pajamas", "The Diary of Anne Frank" and "Suite Francaise".

Our next meeting is on Monday, September 8 at 1:00pm at Liz Read's home. We are reading The Birth House by Ami McKay.


At the meeting, Penny mentioned that





en tasters arrived at my home for our first wine tasting following the original get together. I had chosen Germany as my wine producing country, only to discover that there are not many red wines produced there.


However, I did manage to provide 2 red Pinot Noir from 2 different wineries. This meant that I had 4 white wines and chose a Liefraumilch, a Pinot Gris, a Reisling, which is the most common German wine sold here, together with a Gewurtstramina.

I was amazed that the best wine chosen by most people was the Gewurtstramina which happened to be one of my own stock. I think that this just goes to show that homemade wines can have as good a taste as those from the Liquor Store.

We had a good choice of cheese and crackers and our evening finished off with coffee and a small slice of key lime pie. All in all it was a very good evening to start our regular monthly meetings.








