The day the world held its breath

Our March Speakers **Majors Raymond** and Joan Piercey will be telling their story of the 9/11 terrorist attack on the Twin Towers in New York.

> Here is another account of one person's experience of that attack

n the morning of Tuesday, 11 September 2001, we were 5 hours out of Frankfurt, flying over the North Atlantic.

We received an urgent message and were ordered to land immediately. The captain determined that the nearest airport was 600 km behind us in Gander, Newfoundland.

Once we landed, there were already about 20 other airplanes on the ground from all over the world that had taken this detour on their way to the U.S.

After we parked on the ramp, the captain informed all the passengers of what had just happened in the U.S.

The Canadian Government was in charge of our situation and no one was allowed to dissembark the aircraft. Within a short time, more planes landed and Gander accumulated 53 craft from all over the world, 27 of which were U.S. commercial jets.

In the evening, news filtered to us that the World Trade Center buildings had collapsed and that a fourth hijacking had resulted in a crash.

By now the passengers were

emotionally and physically

stayed amazingly calm. We

dow at the 52 other stranded

exhausted, not to mention

frightened, but everyone

aircraft to realize that we

allowing people off the aircraft one plane at a time. At 6:00pm, Gander airport told us that our turn to deplane would be 11:00am the next morning. Passengers were distressed, but they simply resigned themselves to this news and prepared themselves to spend a night on the airplane.

We had been told earlier that they would be

About 10:30am on the morning of the 12th, a convoy of school buses arrived. We were taken to the terminal where we went through Immigration and Customs and then registered with the Red Cross.

After that, the crew were separated from the passengers and we were taken in vans to a small hotel. We had no idea where our passengers were going.

We learned from the Red Cross that the town of Gander has a population of 10,400 people and they had about 10,500 passengers to take care of from all the airplanes that were forced to land there.

Two days later, we were taken back to the Gander airport. Back on the plane, we were reunited with the passengers and found out what they had been doing for the past two days. What we heard was incredible.

> Gander and all the surrounding communities had closed all high schools, meeting halls, lodges and any other large gathering places. They converted all these facilities into mass lodging areas for the stranded travellers.

High school students volunteered their time to take care of their "guests."



called Lewisporte, about 45 kilometres from Gander where they were put up in a high school. There was a dentist on call and both male and female nurses remained with the passengers for the duration.

Food was prepared by the residents and brought to the schools. Passengers were driven to restaurants of their choice and offered wonderful meals.

Everyone was given tokens for local laundromats to wash their clothes, since luggage was still on the aircraft.

When passengers came on board, everyone knew each other by name and were swapping stories of their stay, they had bonded and were calling each other by their first names, exchanging phone numbers, addresses and email addresses.

And then a very unusual thing happened.

One of our passengers approached me and asked if he could make an announcement over the PA system. He picked up the PA and reminded everyone about what they had just gone through. He reminded them of the hospitality they had received from total strangers. He continued by saying that he would like to do something in return for the good folks of Lewisporte.

He said that he was going to set up a Trust Fund under the name of Delta 15. The purpose of the Trust Fund would be to provide college scholarships for the high school students of Lewisporte. He asked for donations of any amount from his fellow travellers. When the paper with donations got back to us with the amounts, names, phone numbers and addresses, the total was for more than US\$14,000!

The gentleman, an MD from Virginia, promised to match the donations and to start the administrative work on the scholarship. He also said that he would forward this proposal to Delta Corporate and ask them to donate as well.

At this time, US\$1.5 million has been collected and has assisted 134 students in their college education.

I wanted to share this story because we all prefer good news stories. It gives me hope to know that some people, in a far away place, were kind to some strangers who literally dropped out of the sky.

God bless America...God bless Canada...and especially, God bless Newfoundlanders. ■



Tower which has replaced the twin towers of the **World Trade** Centre. It has taken 26,000 people eight years to build the new complex, which has gone over schedule and over budget several times. The tower itself was originally expected to cost around \$3bn, but that figure now stands just shy of \$4bn. The building is close to completion, however. It was topped out in August 2012, and a "spire" was later attached, taking its overall height to 1776 feet - a good 400 feet more than the original Twin Towers.

We ended with desserts, tea and coffee before heading out into the cold again. ■











WINNER MORT

12 Years a Slave

owerful, compelling, unsettling, dark. 12 Years a Slave is not an easy movie to watch. All of us who attended the film were touched by the sheer brutality of the slave era as portrayed by a stunningly talented cast, all of whom deserve Oscars.

But ultimately it is the story, told simply, of the triumph of the human spirit even in the vilest of times.

Many of the scenes from the movie sickened me and will stick with me for a long time. Other scenes, especially of Solomon's face, ultimately brought a sense of hope.

In this movie you see all of man's sins turned against other human beings - lust, greed, hate,

jealousy, deceit, vengeance,

cruelty. But you also see acceptance, kindness, respect, honesty and love that make this movie watchable.

This movie never lets you look away. It makes you uncomfortable. It forces historic reality on you. But you need to see it. ■



The Monuments Men

The cast was superb: George Clooney, Matt Damon, Bill Murray, John Goodman and Hugh Bonneville – Downton Abbey's Robert Crawley, Earl of Grantham, with an almost unrecognizable Cate Blanchett in period clothes, and so many other character actors brought their experience to the screen.

The Monuments Men were an actual team of art experts who went into France and Germany in 1944 to protect the fine art that was being destroyed and confiscated by the Nazis. Hitler "wanted it all" and had planned a huge museum to display his contraband. The story has some interesting twists, especially the scene where Eisenhower gets the glory for art and artifacts recovered by the platoon while the men look on from a distance!

I won't give the plot away, but the conclusion of the movie was excellent. This movie did not get rave reviews, but you could enjoy this movie with friends and family.

We retired for libations to the Live Bait Alehouse, just across the parking lot from the Galaxy. Opening this past May, it is very comfortable and has a good selection of draft on tap and an excellent, affordable menu. Well worth a visit.


