# Taking a bite out of crime Dr. Frank Stechey - Forensic Dentist

Center disaster, 256 forensic dentists worked for months to identify some of the victims. Dr. Stechey was the first of only ten foreign dentists, and the only Canadian, asked to join New York City's dental identification

team.

He has received training and invitations from: the FBI Academy; the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology; the Federal Emergency Management Agency; plus many colleges and universities throughout North America.

He has been a forensic dental consultant for McMaster University's Children's Hospital plus

several municipal, provincial and national police services and Children's Aid Societies throughout

North America.

For over 30 years he has covered both civil and criminal cases including: product liability, homicides, mass disaster response and training, but especially, partner, spousal, senior and child abuse.


A 1971 Toronto graduate, he "retired" from general practice shortly after 9/11 in

2001 and did locum work for dentists in need until last year. He now enjoys being a treatment coordinator and instructor at the Faculty of Dentistry in Toronto.

Renowned Canadian and national radio broadcaster Roy Green has said:

Married to Mary for 46 years, they have three grown children, and four, (so far) grandchildren.









Luckily, the anticipated rain did not materialize so the walk to Anne Marie's house, which is across the road from the New Life Church where we had to park, did not entail getting wet.







# A tough one to read but recommended

would like to start by saying thank you to Joanne Millichamp for hosting April's book club. The book we reviewed was Canadian

author Will Ferguson's 419. Joanne started off the review, however, it didn't take long for the rest of us to join in.

419 is based on the penal code in Nigeria. Crimes can range from petty theft to multi-million dollar scams and anything in between.

The story begins in Canada with a car accident and the family left behind and what they found out about their father and the events leading up to his death and how vulnerable people are and how predatory internet scams can be.

The author then takes a turn and adds two more story lines. The first based on the oil conglomerates and how this impacted

the country and its people. The second about a single pregnant women. We discovered that this character was based loosely on the true story of a young single women who was sentenced to be

stoned to death due to being pregnant out of wedlock. Her sentence was overturned because of a petition that was initiated by Oprah Winfrey and signed by 2 million people.

With all those story lines in one book, be prepared to gather quite a bit of information and possibly being a little confused. The

book jumps from story line to story line between Canada, Nigeria, the pregnant women and the oil conglomerate. Not necessarily in that order.
