oug Spooner has spent his entire life competing, volunteering and working in Sport. Doug began his work on Multi-Sport Games by completing of a Master's of Political Science degree from the University of Waterloo, with a focus on the integration of Organizing Committees, Governments and Security Agencies.

Following a professional hockey career, he has also held planning and operational roles with the Sarnia 2011/Kingston 2013 ParaSport Ontario Summer Games and the Toronto 2012 Ontario Summer Games.

Doug also dedicates his time to improving





his community with volunteer roles with Toronto Sport Council's Sport Hosting Strategy Committee, and on the Board of Directors of For Youth Initiative, a Toronto youth-serving not for profit.

Capitalizing on this passion for Sport, Doug is currently working with the Organizing Committee for the Toronto 2015 Pan Am/Parapan Am American Games Organizing Committee as Senior Manager, Transportation Partner Integration and Planning.

In this role he is responsible for proving up to date planning information to the Ministry of Transportation, 10 Transit Agencies, 16 Municipal Road Authorities, and the Integrated Security Unit. The Games will draw more than 10,000 athletes and officials, 250,000 visitors and 4,000 media to southern Ontario.

Competitions will take place in more than 30 venues located in a 5,300-square kilometre footprint.

To ensure safe, reliable and efficient travel throughout the region, the Pan Am Transportation Team (PATT) is working on an integrated Games-time transportation plan. This plan will deliver services to athletes, officials, media, dignitaries, spectators and volunteers.

The daily luncheon special for example, soup or salad and pasta for \$12 will be announced by our server.

Our true seafoodies might consider antipasto choices of calamari with olives, onion, sun dried tomatoes and feta cheese in house dressing at \$9.88 or Escargot Al Funghi with mushrooms, garlic butter and parmigiano reggiano at \$8.88.

I am curious to find out what a "frizzled" leek might be which is the garnish on their specialty, Cream of Butternut Squash Soup at \$5.

The Panini and Sandwhich selections, all with french fries or salad, have a Vegetarian choice

with grilled seasonal vegetables and mozzarella and pesto spread at \$9.88.

The Reuben comes in at \$10, Veal Scallopini or Chicken Parmigiano at \$12.88, just to mention a few from this category.





After the first evaluation, we had a sample of cheese and then sampled again. All enjoyed the changed format and found that a cheese pairing significantly changed the rating of some of the wines.









## This book chronicles our history


enny hosted our latest discussion on a nonfiction book about the life of Henrietta Lacks, a poor black woman who lived in the Baltimore area in the early 1950s and who died a horrible death from cervical cancer complicated by syphilis and HPV virus infections.

Cells from her cancer were taken and cultured by a doctor at Johns Hopkins hospital.

The book chronicles how those cells became the building block for scientific research from the 1950s up to the present. The sale of those cells by drug companies has earned millions and been instrumental in finding the cure for polio and many different forms of cancer.

Henrietta's family, however, did not benefit from this and lived a life of poverty and great hardship.

The group had a wide-ranging reaction to



the book with ratings from 4 to 8 out of 10 with 10 being an excellent engaging read. All found the story behind the book compelling but there is a heavy dose of biology in the book due to the need to explain how her cells keep living to this day in cultures throughout the world. 📘
