
He is currently (no pun intended) with Birnie Electric in the capacity (no pun intended) of Electrical Solutions Advisor.

Recent statistics for North America Electrical caused fires are: 111,400 fires per year, 860 deaths, 3785 injuries, \$1.3 billion in property losses.

Of note, 100% of the artisan weavers are literate and have not lost a single woman in childbirth.


Although we were small in number, the



Would we recommend this book – YES!!!



No electricity, no running water and no furnace! In spite of the lack of the amenities we take for granted today, Carolyn and her family blossomed. The remoteness of the lighthouse made them appreciate the landscape in a way that city dwellers never can.

Carolyn's insights enhanced our understanding of living in isolation and being embraced by the natural world.



making of the Tiffany lamps and windows, sometimes repetitive.




