## John McDonald


Historian

Tohn McDonald, local author and historian, will speak about the origin behind the names of many of the communities that make up Halton Region.

His colourful PowerPoint presentation includes several beautiful vintage and contemporary photographs of the area.

After four years of research McDonald also provides, for the first time, the life and times of William Halton, the man for whom our region was named and his many contributions to the development of Upper Canada (present day Ontario).

John was born in Milton and is a lifelong resident of Halton. He has conducted extensive research throughout the Halton




After extensive research in England, Bermuda and Ontario a new book Halton's Heritage, introduced in October 2011, features the story of William Halton—the man our county (and region) was named for. This new book, which deals with the origin of place names, includes both written

and pictorial essays for over 70 settlements in Halton.



He graduated from Ryerson Polytechnic Institute in 1971 and served as a Member of Council on both Halton Hills and the Region of Halton for a 10-year period commencing in 1978.

On February 9, 2013 John was recognized for his community efforts and historical research when presented with the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal.



# Wine and laughter at Auriel and Don's place

or this, our second time hosting the Grapenutters, we, or maybe that should read 'Auriel', decided to try something a little different.

With summer fast approaching, I decided to feature Rose wines from the South of France. I know nothing can beat a frosty bottle of Rose whilst seated at a cafe in Arles or Avignon...but why not stretch our imaginations just a little!

The three roses that I chose were; Delas Saint-Esprit Cotes du Rhone, at \$14.95, Famille Perrin Tavel, at \$19.95 and Remy Pannier Rose d'Anjou, at \$14.00.

As so often happens after the tastings, the wine with the highest score, the Rose d'Anjou with 142 points, was the cheapest! Second favourite was Cotes du Rhone with 139 and the most expensive, the Tavel, was last with 135 points.


Before the results were revealed I asked the Grapenutters to decide which part of the world produced these wines and which was the most expensive. Only one person got both answers correct and therefore won the prize, a miniature glass of wine to hang on the Christmas tree. So, congratulations to Udo Tomsom, the wine connoisseur of Britannia Road!

Now it was Don's turn to present two red wines and two white wines from another part of

Europe. No clue was needed, as we served Tapas with these wines and I think it was easy to guess that Spain was the country of origin.

For the reds he chose Montecillo Rioja Reserva at \$18.95 and Castilla De Monseran Garnacha, Carinena at \$9.95. Both of these wines were enjoyed by nearly everyone and scored much higher than the Roses.






Our guests were then asked to choose the most expensive wine, Gillian was the winner. But the cheap little red won the highest score of the evening with 189 points, compared to the Rioja with 177 points. Once again proving that the more expensive is not always best, or that our group does not have sophisticated taste buds!

Then it was the turn for the Spanish whites Miguel Torres Vina Esmeralda and Rene Barbier Mediterranean White to hit the taste buds. The Miguel Torres from Catalunya, costing \$13.95 scored 167 points, beating out the slightly cheaper Rene Barbier, which scored 159.

It was now time for dessert and I think the Tiramisu, although not French, rounded off our evening with European flair.



# Famous and infamous whiskies judged

'ello Probians, the D'Stillers third meeting since it's inauguration in April was held at the home of Wayne and Suzanne Herder on Wednesday June 3rd, where the following Menu was appreciated.

- 1) Glen Breton Rare 10 years, 43% alc/vol. Bottled May 29, 2012. Canada's only single malt Whisky! This whisky was made in the Glenora distillery, Established in 1989 in Glenville, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. This company was the subject of a lawsuit by the Scottish Government over the use of the word 'Glen', Canada won!
- The Dimple Pinch 15 years old, 40% alc/vol. This is a blended Scotch Whisky produced by John Haig & Company which was founded in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1893. Noted for it's dimpled bottle and gold netting. Apparently there is a USA version that is 43% alc/vol.
- 3) Teachers Highland Cream 40% alc/vol. This blended whisky is a very popular whisky in Scotland. Teachers was established in Glasgow in 1830.
- 4) Johnnie Walker Black, 12 years old 40% alc/vol. It is noted as Extra Special Scottish blended whisky. Johnnie Walker was established in Kilmarnock in 1820.

5) Glenmorangie Traditional 57% alc/vol. This is a single malt whisky from the Glenmorganie Distillers which was established in 1843.

As the evening drew to a close we rated the whiskies in the following order.

- 1 Tied for first place was the Glenmorangie Traditional and Teachers Highland Cream.
- 2 Tied for second place was Johnnie Walker Black and Glen Breton Rare.
- 3 Last but not least Haig's Dimple Pinch Testing noses for the evening: Chris, Martin, Alex, Peter and Wayne.


The Sequel Book Club held it's monthly meeting at our home on Wednesday 10th June.


