John has always been interested in Dog Guides having worked with folks who had their Dog Guides with them in the workplace.


He witnessed, first-hand, the amazing difference these companions made in the lives of those who have a physical or mental disability.





The next euchre afternoon will be on March 17th and place to be determined.


We welcomed new players to our group Lorraine Randall and Stephen and Diane Comstock.

The story gives some insight about what made the man, his values, and what he endured to become a Navy Seal. It also dealt with some of the hard decisions he had to make while performing his duties as a sniper during his 4 tours of duty.

it by helping other veterans returning from the war; injured physically or mentally, however he and a friend were ultimately gunned down by a young unstable returning veteran while trying to help that veteran through his ordeal.


The mystery husband made a starring appearance and was totally into the beach theme apparel as well.
















Drama set against the Falls

wenty-five hardy souls braved the February deep-freeze to visit the BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir in Toronto.

The Mandir is a traditional Hindu place of worship and was built in 2007 with over 6,000 tons of marble and limestone.

We first watched an informational video at the 'Haveli', which is the entrance courtyard built using intricately hand-carved figures of dancers, musicians, peacocks, elephants and lotus flowers.

The next stop was the Museum, which took us on a journey of discovery into India's over 10,000-year-old heritage. Uniquely crafted exhibits educate visitors about India's contributions in art, architecture, science and education.

Next, we visited the Mandir, which is the actual place of worship. Words cannot describe the workmanship of the marble interior. 24,000 pieces of stone were carved in India by 1,500 craftsmen.

The stone was crafted into pillars, ceilings (40 of them and each one different) and figures of deities and assembled on site in Toronto, a jigsaw puzzle we couldn't even imagine.

Interestingly, the whole site was constructed without the use of nails or steel, using ancient techniques. It was an interesting and informative visit.

To end the morning in style, we then visited

Humber College and enjoyed lunch in the dining room prepared by student chefs and staffed by hospitality students. ■



evening of cards, companionship, fun and of course wine! Highlight of the evening was Ron Millichamp's score of 24, which if memory serves, ties our highest score record!


Lowlight, if it can be called that, was Liz's winning streak coming to an end! This was Liz's third night of crib from starting, we thought, as a novice!

One of our Club members has recently attended this restaurant with a large group for lunch and recommends it. She assures me that the food is very good and is certainly worth a visit.





Grapenuts - Duties of the host

- Decide on wine "theme" for tasting.
- Buy wine/advise participants of cost/collect from each participant. If participant doesn't attend, ensure he/she reimburses you.
- Have wines ready to drink (e.g.: chilled, opened - as appropriate), in bags (to hide what they are), and numbered.
- Have wine glasses, water, small snacks (not elaborate), plain crackers, coffee/tea available.
 (I have 8 plain wine glasses available for host to borrow). Dessert at end this is NOT a dining club, so please don't get elaborate.
- Have wine evaluation sheets and pencils available. We use the American Wine Society evaluation sheet and guidelines.
- Get a volunteer to host next month's meeting, if necessary.

- If you take photos, please forward one or two
 of the best to Alan Jordan at
 alan@jordanar.com
 for inclusion in our Forum.
- Summarize evaluation sheets, to get group evaluation. Share the details of each wine with your crew of tasters.
- Email me a brief report on the tasting:
 - 1. Names of participants.
 - 2. Names of people you had to turn down (if any). This will help indicate if we need a third group.
 - 3. "Theme" of the tasting.
 - 4. Information on the winning wine(s), show ing: Name and type of wine; winery name (if not apparent from wine name); type/grape; where from; cost; LCBO number; average score (out of 20).
 - 5. Anything else of note.
- Host acquires "ownership" of whatever is left in the bottles after tasting is finished. (but don't pour with too heavy or light a hand!)
- Host needs to watch for any signs of over indulgence and take action if concerned. Each participant also has a personal responsibility for his or her own sobriety - if in doubt, ask for a drive or call a cab.
- Make sure you enjoy yourself too!

Avril shared a poem that she wrote, a




"Tribute to her Dad". She spoke about the many crossroads in his life on his journey from Ireland to London, England.


Bring a book - take a book when you join the Ravenous Readers Recycle Club.

The central focus was a teenaged boy with autism who was the narrator of the book.


This led to discussions about how autism has effected the lives of book club members through family or work. The book is an easy read as it flows well.
