# By-Law Amendment

s mentioned at the August meeting there needs to be a formal amendment made to our Escarpment PROBUS Club's by-laws. When our first set of by-laws was formalized last year, the management team had inadvertently omitted this important clause. We have taken the wording from PROBUS Canada's template for by-laws to be used by all clubs. Now that the notice of motion has been given we can vote to accept the revision. This will be one of the items of business at the AGM. Please review and contact me directly if you have any concerns or questions.



The new clause reads:

#### By-Law No. 7 - Non Profitability

- 1. Club activities are to be budgeted to break even.
- 2. The club may advance funds, with approval of the Management Committee, when prepayment of event tickets are required prior to collection of funds from Members. Such advances shall be repaid to the Club.
- 3. An individual member of the Club must not gain from a discount, commission, gratuity or other benefit arising from a Club activity.







Hello again Probians. The Whiskey club's monthly meeting was held at Michael Hooker's home on 5th August where we had the pleasure of tasting and critiquing four whiskies.





**No 1** - Old Fettercairn a 10 yr old single malt, this whisky was evaluated at 71/100.

No 2 - Oban a 14 yr old single malt, we thought this was worth 81/100.

**No 3** - Lagavulin a 16 yr old single malt, was evaluated as the best whisky of the evening at 87/100.

**No 4** - Glenfarclas 105 a 10 yr old single malt, we thought this one was worth 70/100.

#### Scintillating facts:

Part of the history of Old Fettercairn, John Gladstone, the second owner of Old Fettercairn was the father of William Gladstone a three time elected Prime Minister of Great Britain who passed legislation alleviating taxes on the whisky industry. I WONDER WHY!





The distillery in OBAN was established in 1793 and was build before the town of Oban itself was established.

Lagavulin is one of the six classic malts of Scotland. The island of Islay, where Lagavulin is made, is only 239 Sq, Miles (61,956 hectares) but is home to nine distilleries.


Glenfarclas Malt has a staggering 60% alcohol per volume, one of the highest alcohol contents in any Scottish whisky. The Distillery has an annual production of 3 million liters per year. As early as

1973 they established a visitor's center a pioneering idea at the time.

Scotland imports 1 million oak barrels from the USA per year.

Collectively Scottish Distilleries produce 1 Billion bottles per year.

A special thanks to Pete Shermet for crafting a beautiful container (dubbed "The Holy Grail") to hold our Whiskey tasting "Glencairn" glasses.

# Ole for Sangria!

e chose Spanish wines as our theme, because we had recently returned from an Insight bus tour of Southern Spain, including a visit to one of the wine cellars (bodegas).





Nine of us ploughed

our way through four passable wines that only averaged around 10, before finally being rewarded for our patience with Red Guitar, which achieved an average of 13. Interestingly # 4, Luis Canas Crianza, 2011 cost \$17.95 and was recommended by a wine expert. Whereas, we only gave it 9.5. (Maybe we are the experts!) We gave the last wine, Real Sangria an average of 15.3, probably because we were comparing it to the other five. Whether you prefer red or white wine, I think most people find Sangria enjoyable. We decided that the best time to drink it is any time, other than

with dinner. The enjoyable soiree was topped off with some Spanish Sherry. Their wines may not be all that great, but the Spaniards certainly know how to make a good sherry.

There was a prize for the one who could guess "the odd man out", which was won by Rosalind Jordan. It was the Pinot Grigio, because it was not made in Spain. It was one of a batch of wine which we made at Carafe for our son's wedding in 2012. We just wanted to make sure it was still fit to drink. As there appears to be no ill effects, I presume it is still OK.

ugust was our first month with three tastings. We had a good attendance at all three, after a bit of cajoling and some Grapenutters volunteering to attend more than one. I should have remembered that August is a good month for people to go away to other drinking places! Well, we all learn by experience.

#### Monday 3rd August - Michael Hooker

Theme: "El Cheapo" - Wines under \$10 recommended by Gord Stimmell, wine correspondent for Toronto Star, as great values.

Best of the night: JJ McWilliam's Shiraz Cabernet 2013 (Australia). Score: 15.0. LCBO 16471. Price \$9.95. This wine was definitely a cut above the rest (which still represented good value). This shows that in many cases there isn't a direct link between price and quality, and our tasting experiences over that past year have proved the truth of this - in several cases the highest rated wine was the cheapest.

After the official tasting, I opened a bottle of Tawny Port that was probably at least 20 years old - to give us all a taste of "Really Good Stuff".



# Next Year's Trip: Poland & Prague!


