Lilly did not agree with this belief. She secretly learned how to drive. This enraged her mother and she was forced to leave their very "upper

class" home. The First World War had started and Lilly joined the WAAC as an ambulance driver. She was sent to the hospital base on the front lines in France. There she met a general surgeon, Robert Fraser. She had met him previously, but, because he came from a very poor background, Lilly's mother deemed him unsuitable for her. Needless to say their romance flourished in in spite of the war. The book also describes many of the hardships that the soldiers endured in this war, and the difficulties hospital staff had in dealing with this difficult time.

Somewhere in France is an interesting book, easy to read, and gives a realistic view of a very difficult time period.

## Life after Life by Kate Atkinson

"Life after Life" by Kate Atkinson proved to be a curious and somewhat frustrating book to tackle. Beginning in the early 1900's with the birth,



death and rebirth of the main character, Ursula, we eventually come to recognize Ursula's unique gift. Ursula is able to relive and redirect the outcomes of her life's events. These Groundhog Day revisions continue until Ursula is satisfied with the new path created. World War I ends and World War II begins during this timeframe and Ursula throws herself into the War rescue effort during the horrific time of the London Blitz. In one version of her life, Ursula befriends Eva Braun and becomes entwined in Hitler's inner social circle. One has to read the book to the bitter end to determine which of these many life experiences are relived and changed and what becomes Ursula's true path.

On the "Pro" side of the book, the concept is interesting and illustrates how simple choices can dramatically alter life's direction. The living hell of the London Blitz was well described in it's horror.

On the "Con" side, the continual changes of time and dates while living and reliving events were incongruous and presented difficulties in navigating through the story. New characters appeared abruptly without introduction. Occasionally narrative was in German without translation. It was not an easy read.

Carolyn, the most vocal fan of "Life after Life", assured us that Kate Atkinson is an excellent author and her many books were superior to this one. The other seven of us were quite certain that we would not recommend this book. The good news is that



## Heavy Drinking Reported on Coulson Avenue in Milton!

n Thursday the 3rd of March, fourteen thirsty Grapenutters gathered at the home of "The Happy (Michael) Hooker" in Milton for an evening of jollity, starting with a very naughty Edwardian-type song about Madeira (the wine, not the island or the cake) to get us in the right frame of mind.

Then the "theme" of the evening was revealed - a tour through the great Fortified Wines. These have an alcoholic content of between 15% and 20%, by the addition of distilled grape spirit after the initial fermentation. Each of the wines was paired with snacks enhancing our appreciation - olives, nuts, dried fruit, cheeses, chocolate.

We started off with a very dry Manzanilla Sherry - with olives, salted nuts and feta cheese. Several found it too dry - probably best enjoyed under a warm Spanish sky with a beautiful senorita and a large plate of Tapas! Things improved as we got into the White Port (Taylor Fladgate). A lot of lipsmacking, and cries of "This is a bit of all right".


Then came the Marsala (Italian) - fairly dry. Heavy caramelish flavour, and like the Sherry, not to everybody's taste!

After a pause to refresh our palates and snack on goodies, we hit the really sweet stuff - starting with the Lustau East India Solera Sherry - beautifully smooth and full-bodied. Scores went up.

Now the Madeira - this one really got us excited. In fact one Grapenutter whose name starts with Ron scored it 20 out of 20! We all can guess what he's going to ask Santa for at Christmas!

As a finale, I broke open a bottle of Late Bottled Vintage Port from 1991 that I had in my basement for about 20 years - we matched it with the only cheese that is appropriate - Stilton, of course! Again, murmurs of delight.

At this point we had the nearest thing to a really serious dispute - the scores of the Madeira and the Port were only 2 points apart in total, (or, as they say, about the



width of a gnat's eyebrow) - so do we declare the higher of the two scores the overall winner? Then when we considered the magnificence of both wines, harmony was restored, and we agreed on a tie for first place - the Madeira and the Port - scoring 16.1 out of 20.

After this serious work, we restored ourselves with cake, coffee, etc., plus our favourites among the wines. We were so preoccupied with all this good stuff that nobody thought to take any pictures!

Finally, out into the cold Milton night and home to


