

### A Story of Survival, Love and Freedom

With courage, grace and powerful insight the author captures the epic panorama of WWII and illuminates an intimate part of history seldom seen: the women's war. "The Nightingale" tells the stories of two sisters, separated by years and experience, by ideals, passion and circumstance, each embarking on her own dangerous path toward survival, love, and freedom in German-occupied, war-torn France—a heartbreakingly beautiful novel that celebrates the resilience of the human spirit and the durability of women. The novel is an homage to the extraordinary courage and endurance of Frenchwomen during

World War II.

Kristin Hannah was inspired to write the novel by the story of a Belgian woman, Andrée de Jongh, who helped downed Allied pilots to escape Nazi territory.

It is an emotionally inspiring story with well-drawn characters whom you grow to care about deeply. It is also historically informative. It will keep you guessing throughout about the two sisters, Vianne and Isabelle, both brave young women who did what they thought was the right thing to do in the most of difficult circumstances.

A feature film adaptation of "The Nightingale" is coming. Michelle MacLaren is a television director and producer who has been signed to direct it. She has directed episodes of The X-Files, Breaking Bad, The Walking Dead and Game of Thrones.

Many in the group found it a very compelling read and hard to put down, some of us had read it before and really enjoyed rereading it. It is a novel that we would definitely recommend it to others.


New members are always welcome. Don't be afraid if your knowledge of board games is limited, we are playing for fun, and there are always players learning as we go.

### Saintly Whiskies

he November meeting of the D'Stillers was held at my home where five hearty D'Stillers joined me in sharing our love for whisky and drinking a dram to our missing comrades who were unable to join us for the evening.





Our winning whisky of the evening was *Strathisla 12 year' old Single Malt*.

Founded in 1786, Strathisla distillery is the oldest continuously operating distillery in northern Scotland. The original name of Strathisla was the Milton Distillery. It's malts are the base whiskies in Chives Regal.

The number two whisky was "Singleton of Dufftown" 12 year old Single Malt. Over half of Scotland's malt whisky distilleries are found on Speyside and the Dufftown distillery is in the center of this fertile region. This is a good tasting whisky under \$60 it's had great reviews in whisky magazines.

The third whisky '*Glenmorangie the Duthac*' Single Malt. This whisky derives it's name from St Duthac a saint from the middle-ages in Northern Scotland. This whisky does not indicate it's age on the bottle which is becoming a common practice in the whisky industry. This whisky is also called a Travellers brand which means that it is sold at

### All About Hand Quilting

our members of the Piece Makers met on Monday, Nov. 7 where Ellen Crawford gave us a demo on hand quilting. There is just something unbelievably wonderful about hand quilting. Not only does quilting done by hand remind us of the quilts from yesterday, but it also provides a soft finish that really can't be achieved any other way. Here are a few hand quilting basics that you should be aware of if you are just getting started (or need a little refresher!).



Needles are the most essential tool for hand quilting. Most experienced hand quilters agree that using the "between" style of needle works best for hand quilting. A size 10 is needle ideal, as the eye isn't too big or too small, and the needle is strong enough to handle the layers of most quilt back designs, batting and quilt top without being too big and bulky.

Thread is another necessity for hand quilting. If you are using all cotton fabric, you will want to use a cotton thread. Many quilters find that coating their thread with a product like Thread Magic helps keep the thread from knotting while stitching. Since many quilters have different preferences when it comes to thread, you may have to try a few different types of quilting thread to find one that's durable and yet easy to work with.

Quilting hoops are used for ease of quilting. Many different styles of hoops are available, including handheld hoops, lap hoops and standing quilt hoops. When hand quilting smaller projects, many quilters prefer not to use a hoop, but for larger projects they are a great help. One mistake often made by beginners is placing their quilt too tightly in the hoop. Since the fabric needs to be able to move up and down as you quilt, make sure there is enough "give" for some movement.



We also attempted to complete a quilting crossword puzzle. We all learned a few new quilting terms such as Big Stitch – A type of quilting where sometimes colourful thread is used to make large stitches, showcasing a decorative effect. It was a great way for hand quilters to show off and embellish their quilts.

Our next meeting will be on Monday, Dec. 5 at the home of Wendy Stringer. We will learn about Prairie Points. New members are always welcome





### Steam Whistle Brewery Tour

wenty-five Probians gathered out in front of the brewery at about 11:15 for a group photo and only one person was missing (the photographer)!

We entered the Brewery and were immediately welcomed with a sample of their beer (It had to be 5:00 somewhere!)



We were directed upstairs where Rylan, one of our tour guides, gave us some background and history about how the brewery started (3 former

"displaced" employee's of Upper Canada Breweries). He also gave us some history of the building that the brewery is located in (The Round House). All this while our other tour guide Niall (a licensed beer sommelier) was busy rounding up some more beer for us to sample. We have now all had the freshest beer we have ever had as every bottle is date and time stamped when it is filled! Our beer was bottled on November 17th at 11:38 am and our tour

started at 11:30, we were drinking it just minutes after being bottled and it was good.

They divided us into two groups and the first group went with Rylan. We stayed back with Niall for the "Irish Tour"! He offered our group another bottle of beer which we graciously accepted while he described the brewing process and explained that they only make one style of beer (a Czech Pilsner) following their motto "Do one thing and Do it well!" and the process is the



traditional Czech method with only 4 ingredients: pure spring water (from Caledon), malted barley (Canadian grown), hops and yeast. NO PRESERVATIVES!

We started our tour about ten minutes after the first group and saw how the mash was put together to form the wort, which was then left to ferment and in about 28 days we have beer. A nice easy drinking pilsner.

We came back to the meeting room and had our chocuterie of pretzels, meats and cheeses and a glass of unfiltered beer, which finished the tour nicely. Since our club is revenue neutral I purchased 3 souvenirs



and the brewery was kind enough to top it up with coasters, bottle openers and 4 additional passes each for brewery tours.

We had a draw and the winners were Paul Crawford, John Flynn and Wayne Lister.

Now to top it off, as we were leaving our guides, one of the bartenders gave each one of us a souvenir glass, which was totally unexpected!

Everyone enjoyed the tour and the folks at Steam Whistle Breweries did a fabulous job!


