### Celebrating Cinco de Mayo

t was the 5th of May when Alan and I hosted the GrapeNuts wine tasting, and of course, that meant it was Cinco de Mayo, the day Mexicans commemorate the Mexican Army's unlikely victory over French forces at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862.

So we decided to celebrate by sourcing wine from Spanish speaking countries, since Mexico does not really produce wine.

We did find some Spanish cheeses, a Manchego, an Iberico which are both made from sheep's milk, together with a hard cheese, Mahon de Menorca, from cow's milk.

The best of the white wines was a crisp, fresh and a light summer sipping wine, a Rene Barbier from Spain and at a reasonable price of \$9.95. This was given an average score of 13.17. The LCBO suggestion is to serve chilled with seafood or pasta. This was a personal favourite of mine.



The best red and overall favourite was a Pata Negra Reserva, Spanish Rioja at \$17 a bottle. Although this might be considered on the pricey side, the LCBO described this wine as refined, elegant, quality cedar, crisp acidity, fresh and beautifully made. To my limited palate it is a rich red and has rich fruity tasting undertones. It was given a resounding 16.8 average by us all.

We finished the evening with a taster of Licor 43, which is a popular Spanish liqueur. This was recommended to us by my cousin who lives in Spain. It is only seasonally available from the LCBO at the cost of \$30.90. We purchased it around Christmastime. It is made from 43 different, closely guarded ingredients; some of the flavours are vanilla, citrus, chocolate, marshmallow, blossoms, herbs and spices. It certainly is a delicious way to end the evening.

### The Illegal a Good Read

### A Dramatic Tale



his month's book selection was M.L Stedman's novel "A Light Between Oceans." The story begins as a post WW1 account of a decorated soldier's efforts to settle down in Australia in 1918.



Tom Sherbourne is desperate to escape the horrific memories of the war and accepts a posting as a lighthouse keeper on a remote island off the south-west coast of Australia.

Before leaving shore, he meets the Headmaster's daughter, Isabel, and within two years, they marry and set off for an idyllic life on Janus Rock.



Their joy turns to sadness after 3 miscarriages. A dinghy washes up on the rocks carrying a young man, dead on arrival, and a baby, still alive. They assume the mother has drowned.

Isabel interprets this as a gift from God and convinces Tom to keep the child.

When they return to the mainland two years later, they are faced with a heart wrenching moral dilemma. The child's mother, Hannah, is alive and still hoping to find her lost child.

The tale unfolds in a dramatic fashion, drawing the readers into an emotional roller coaster and a cliffhanging ending.

Our group gave a 9+ rating for the author's writing skills and for the compelling and believable characters she brings to life as they foster our empathy throughout the events that unfold.

Highly recommended reading. A movie version is due out in September.

### Brandies at the Happy Hooker's

hough we (The D'Stillers) are normally dedicated to whiskeys of various types (often of Scottish attribution), we are prepared to venture into the territories of other types of spirituous liquors on occasion!



So on 4th May a group of adventurous D'Stillers headed for Michael Hooker's to sample some interesting brandies - from Spain and France.



Spanish brandies from Jerez, distilled from the Airen grape, are aged in old Sherry casks, using the same Solera system as for Sherry, with different vintages blended together year after year. The resulting brandy is generally richer and sweeter than French brandies, and the best can be good value compared to leading cognacs.

We tried two of the best: Cardenal Mendoza and 1866 Brandy Gran Reserva. For several D'Stillers, these were a revelation - raised eyebrows and lip-smacking surprise and appreciation!

Then we headed into France, to the Cognac Region, to taste two good examples of their brandies: Camus VSOP Elegence and D'usse Cognac VSOP ("VSOP" stands for "Very Superior Old Pale"). Both really enjoyable, but certainly different from the Spanish brandies - dryer, not as heavy.

Finally, to return us to our Scottish roots, we finished up with a small taste of Aberlour A'Bunadh (Gaelic for "of the origin"), a Highland Single Malt - just a sip, as this stuff is potent - 60% alcohol! Wow! Liquid fire! Then after coffee and cake, the Designated Drivers carted everybody back home.



men sought safety with each other in the back yard! Once the food appeared (and the weather had cooled off), they braved the women to join us inside. As always, a good time was had by all.






### Romantic Comedy & Animation

#### The Jungle Book Synopsis:





### Probians Watch Fire Fighters Demolish a Car

uesday May the 24th was a beautiful hot sunny day for the 16 Probians who attended the tour of the The Garry W. Morden Centre. The centre is home to the Mississauga Fire and Emergency Services Training and Mechanical Divisions, City of Mississauga Information Technology Training, the Toronto Scottish Army Reserve Company and the Peel Regional Police. It is a huge complex of many acres located on the Ninth Line just below Steeles in Mississauga.



We began our tour in a training room where we were briefed on the concept of *Prevention*, *Detection and Escape*. We especially learned a lot about Smoke Detectors. Important take home ideas included: always unplug small appliances that create heat (eg: toasters, kettles); don't overload receptacles; don't leave the stove

unattended while cooking. These are leading causes of fire. We also learned that the small fire extinguishers are only good for about 3 seconds, so we should have a minimum of a 5 pound extinguisher. This extinguisher should be handily located so that you are not searching for it at the back of the cupboard under the sink while your stove-top is on fire.

Next up was a grand tour of the grounds. We piled into two vans and went sightseeing. We went by the Rescue Tower where training is conducted with artificial smoke only. The fire fighters actually rappel down the sides of this building. The internal walls are moveable to keep the fire-fighters on their toes. Then to the Burn Building - real fires are used for training here. There were large piles of wooden pallets and bales of hay in the back for this purpose. Again, the walls in the building are moveable to reconfigure the building into either a set of town-houses or a mansion. We also went by a large pond which is used for water rescue practice. The grounds also had a tanker car on rails and a tractor trailer set up for training scenarios.

For our last stop on the tour, we got to watch a group of new trainees being instructed in the art of extracting a passenger from a car. Extraction is easier and safer from the rear, so they covered the passenger with a blanket and smashed all the rear windows. The Jaws of Life and Hydraulic shears were used to remove the rear door and the pillar it was attached to, before pulling out the passenger onto a rescue board.



This session ended with two group photo-ops: one of us and the fire fighters and another of our ladies with the sole female fire fighter trainee. This was a thoroughly entertaining and educational day for all of us.

## Whistling Gardens Instead of Dixie

n Wednesday, May 25th nineteen ladies and one man boarded our bus and travelled to Whistling Gardens in Wilsonville (not too far from Brantford) to visit one of Canada's privately run Botanical Gardens. Although the gardens are beautiful the highlight was the tour given by the owner Darren Heimbecker, the man with a vision and exceptional knowledge about varieties of conifers and other plant material.



Whistling Gardens was purchased as a farm; Darren's wife liked the house and he had the space to design (approximately 20 acres). In 2010 he started creating the gardens; prior to that he was propagating plants that he could incorporate into his designs. He modelled the amphitheatre and fountains after the Palace of Versailles and wrote the music that the fountains "dance" to. Darren demonstrated how to

propagate, prune and

candle evergreens. We were amazed by the number of varieties and foliage colours. Although Mother Nature hasn't cooperated with our cold spring some Peonies were out as well as some Iris and we learned the differences between common, tree and Itoh peonies that don't require cages or staking and will be in bloom for a month.

After leaving the garden we had an enjoyable lunch at a nearby restaurant, Boston Commons.
