

leven "connoisseur" wine tasters sipped their way through three whites, chosen because of their variety of fruits, including pineapple, pear, apple, citrus, lychee and other tropical fruits, with some hazelnut and vanilla thrown in as a bonus. My theme was





inspired by the cartoon: "So I was just wondering...Do 3 glasses of wine and 2 Bloody Marys equal 5 servings of fruits and vegetables?"

The "flavanoids" idea came from a documentary on PBS. They explained that Lindemans Cawarra Shiraz Cabernet had the least amount of flavanoids and San Silvestro Brumo Nebbiolo d'Alba 2013 the most. When I explained that you would have to drink more glasses of the Lindemans to the San Silvestro to get your flavonoids, Martin said that he prefers quantity to quality.

Wine number 6, which was Diabolica Red Wine VQA from the Okanagan Valley, (\$16.15) had nothing to do with Fruit or Flavonoids. I only chose it because it contained three of my favourite things:

dark chocolate, blueberry and vanilla. Obviously most everyone else agreed, because it was the favourite, with a score of 175, which was 22 more than #2 - San Silvestre.

I also learned from the evening that men like cheese more than women .... do. The five men all sat together at one half of the table. We had fun taking turns asking trivia questions from our cocktail napkins (I think Anna was the winner). An entertaining and informative evening, as usual.

During the afternoon, 10 yahtzees were rolled (5 of the same number) – quite a feat!


Plenty of fun was had by all. We encourage anyone interested to join us. No experience required, some or all of us are learning new games each month.

he Trilogy Book Club met at my home September 15 to discuss M.L. Stedman's award winning first novel *The Light Between Oceans*.

Set on a remote island off the coast of Western Australia in the 1920's, a lighthouse keeper and his wife make a momentous decision which later proves to have heart wrenching and devastating consequences.



While the book was not universally loved among our members, the plot was very conducive to a lively discussion on the moral choices made by the protagonists. We examined the roles of the characters' backgrounds, isolation, time period, physical surroundings and circumstances on their decision making.

While some couldn't put the book down, others felt there was a lack of character development in the first half which impeded their ability to get into the story. However, all agreed that the physical description of the main setting and the symbolism used by the author were extremely effective in highlighting the sense of isolation and remoteness which was the world of the two protagonists.

All our members are anxious to see the movie version as this is definitely a story to make one think deeply about the far reaching consequences of moral choices and the sometimes blurry distinction between right and wrong.

Our next meeting is Thursday October 20 at the home of Chris Cormier. Our book selection is *The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry* by Rachael Joyce.



### Don't Pronounce it "Tea Bag"

he D'Stillers held their September meeting at the home of Robyn Balfour, the token lady in our group, who I am sad to say, has decided to leave us. The D'Stillers have enjoyed Robyn's company these last few months and will certainly miss her critique of the Whisky from a woman's perspective.





There were nine members in attendance, Robyn selected four Scotch whiskies and one Bourbon for our tasting pleasure.

The winner of the evening, *Oban 14 year old Single Malt whisky*. Oban is one of the smallest distilleries in Scotland where a town was built around the Distillery. *Score of 79.2/100* 

The second whisky of the night, Glenlivet Founders Reserve Single Malt. There is no age indicated on this

whisky. This appears to be the future of Scotch Whisky where the distillers are omitting the age of the whiskies. Glenlivet is the biggest selling single malt whisky in the USA. *Score of 77.1/100* 

Third whisky of the evening, *Bowmore 12 year old Single Malt.* Bowmore is one of the oldest Distillers in Scotland founded in 1779. This whisky has a strong peat, smoke and salt finish due to the ageing process taking place in a warehouse which is below sea level. *Score of 69.4/100* 



The fourth whisky was 'Te Bheag' a blended whisky from a Gaelic whisky company on the Isle of Skye. 'Te Bheag' is pronounced 'chey vek', not 'tea bag'. 'Te Beag' or 'The Little Lady', is the name of the boat on the whisky bottle label and the colloquial Gaelic expression for a 'wee dram'. Score of 65.9/100

The last tasting of the evening was *Woodford Reserve Bourbon*. This bourbon is made in the oldest and smallest Distillery in Kentucky. As reflected by its low score, perhaps it was unfair to judge bourbon after tasting four Scottish whiskies, since it is a \$50 bottle of Bourbon we would have expected a higher score . *Score of 52.8/100* 



This concluded the Whisky tasting for the evening. Robyn had nice snacks for the DD's to nibble on while the D'Stillers got down to business.

Thanks again to Robyn for the Coffee, more snacks and great conversation after the D' Stillers finished their evening sippings.

As always, thanks to the DD's for our safe journey home.

### Our 2017 Trip - Austria and Her Neighbours

ext year our tour will visit 5 countries in Europe, Austria, Germany, Liechenstein, Switzerland and Slovenia. This is a delightful, restful program featuring a 2-centre stay in Austria, beginning at our first hotel in the city of Bregenz, located directly on Lake Constance in the green foothills of the Alps. We will tour the Bregenz Forest, an area of rolling hills and picturesque villages. We will ride on the steam railway and enjoy a visit to an authentic cheese maker and sample some cheeses from the region. Hi-lights in Germany include a visit to the island city of Lindau, with its 12th century tower and medieval walls plus the Zepplin Museum and the fairy tale castle of Meersburg. In Liechenstein, the 6th smallest country in the world we will tour the capital city of Vaduz. Then on to Davos, Switzerland, a winter sports mecca, known for the annual World Economic Summit.

We then travel on a panoramic train across Austria to their 2nd largest city Graz. Visits in this area include the town of Piber, which is home to the Lipizzaner Stud Farm. These beautiful white horses are the oldest breed in Europe. Our tour includes the museum, stables and we will enjoy petting the 30-40 foals born each year.

After a tour through the Styria region (known as the green heart of Austria) we will enjoy lunch of local wine, cheeses, and cold cuts at a cozy tavern. Later we visit the Castle of Seggau with its 300 year old wine cellar and enjoy more sampling.

Our last country is Slovenia where we see the city of Maribor and enjoy a walking tour of the medieval city centre. Then its on to Ljubijana, the capital. Ljubijana is a beautiful small city with a pretty little river meandering through the town. The city centre is also car-free. Our final stop is a visit to a family owned chocolate factory where we will tour the production process and then enjoy a chocolate aperitif, sample chocolates and finish with coffee and schnapps and a take home souvenir.

The dates are October 10th to 20th, 2017. The weather in October is typically warm during the day, in the mid-teens with cool, crisp autumn evenings.

The cost is \$3,695 per person, which includes your flights, all breakfasts, all dinners and 2 lunches. Airport departure taxes are extra. The single supplement is \$400.00.

Located in Sopot, Poland, this commercial building is a popular landmark for tourists and photographers. Built in 2004, this 4,000 sq. meter building is part of the Rezydent shopping center.

Inspiration for the unusually shaped building came from Polish fairytale illustrations by Jan Marcin Szancer and Per Dahlberg. Appearing almost as though warped by a person playing with mirrors, tourists are often hesitant to enter the vertigo-inducing entrance. It is home to many popular shops, restaurants, and even a radio station.



#### **Container City**

The original and first Container City project, located at Trinity Buoy Wharf, in the heart of London's Docklands. Completed in 5 months in 2001, Container City I was originally 3 stories high providing 12 work studios across 4,800 sq ft. After high demand a fourth floor was added in 2003. As well as being very cost effective, Container City is environmentally friendly with over 80% of the building created from recycled material.

#### The Gangster House

This wooden house is in Arkhangelsk, Russia. The 13-story residence of the local crime lord Nikolai Petrovich Sutyagin was reported to be the world's, or at least Russia's, tallest wooden house. Constructed over 15 years, without formal plans or a building permit, the structure deteriorated while the owner spent a number of years in prison for racketeering.





#### Habitat 67

A community housing complex in Montreal, designed by Canadian architect Moshe Safdie. It was originally conceived as his master's thesis in architecture at McGill University and was then built as a pavilion for Expo 67. It is located on an island on the St Lawrence River. Habitat 67 is widely considered an architectural landmark and one of the most recognizable and significant buildings in Montreal, Canada and the world.

#### The Dancing House

Nickname given to the Nationale-Nederlanden building on the Rašín Embankment in Prague, Czech Republic. It was designed by the Croatian-Czech architect Vlado Milunić in cooperation with Canadian-American architect Frank Gehry on a vacant riverfront plot.
