Older Not Necessarily Better By Chris Strachan - Convenor

he D'Stillers held their August meeting at the home of Bill Willcocks and Kathy Schmidt. There were nine members in attendance and Bill selected five Scotch whiskies for our tasting pleasure.



The number one Whisky of the evening was *Old Pulteney Single Malt.* The distillery was established in 1826 in the name of Sir William Pulteney (who died in 1805), and for whom Pulteneytown is named. Sir William was an Advocate, Landowner and a Politician. He was reputedly the wealthiest man in Great Britain at that time with his net worth being a staggering 12 Billion Pounds in today's money. The distillery is the most northerly on the Scottish mainland and was quite inaccessible, except by sea, when established. Barley was brought in by sea, and the whisky was shipped out the same way. Many of the distillery workers were also employed as fishermen.

The second Whisky of the evening was *Bunnahabhain 12 Year Old Single Malt.* The Bunnahabhain Distillery was founded in 1881 near Port Askaig on the island of Islay off the west coast of Scotland. Due to it's isolated location the Distillery built houses for it's workers hence the village of Bunnahabhain was founded. Bunnahabhain is one of the milder single malt Islay whiskies available and its taste varies greatly from other spirits to be found on the island of Islay.

The third Whisky for our enjoyment was *Auchentoshan 12 Year Old Single Malt*. Unusual for a Scottish distillery, Auchentoshan practices triple distillation. Generally the final stage of Scotch whisky production involves distilling the fermented mash in two copper stills. In Auchentoshan, a third still (known as the "Intermediate Still") helps to give a final spirit strength of 81% ABV (162 proof). This triple distillation, in addition to an unpeated malt, gives Auchentoshan a more delicate and sweet flavour than many Scotch whiskies. The Warehouse in Glasgow was bombed during WW2 and whiskey ran into the River Clyde. The Scots could handle the bombing but the loss of the whiskey was a national disaster!

The Fourth Whisky of the evening was *The Laddie Eight*, an 8 year old Single Malt made by the Bruichladdich Distillery. The 'Laddie' range of whisky consistently undermines the myth that 'the older a whisky gets, the better it becomes'. The reality in the glass is much more interesting. The Distillery's fiercely independent ethos defies the trend towards industrialisation and automation in distillation. They are justifiably proud of their status as the biggest private employer on Islay - where an enthusiastic team of 85 men and women still create whiskies by hand without the assistance of computers.

The fifth Whisky was *Dun Bheagan 2010 Single Malt*. This Whisky is a combination of three different single malts from Speyside, Islay and the Highlands. The blending of this Whisky is done by Ian Macloud one of the biggest bottling companies in Scotland. Macloud carries approx. 20,000 maturing barrels of whisky in it's warehouse at any given time.

This concluded the Whisky tasting for the evening. Thanks to Kathy for entertaining the DD's and for the coffee, snacks and fine conversation. As always, thanks to the DD's for our safe journey home.

Slavic Wines a Pronunciation Challenge By Auriel Halliday - Correspondent

he temperature was HIGH inside and out, but it did not stop our rather large group of tasters from having a lot of laughs and we had quite a large group. First thing we learned was that Auriel can't count, but the bottles did go around fifteen times ... so who worried. Then we learned that our Ipad calculator is a "rogue" ... Or was that the operator?





Finally we started tasting the chosen wines. Don and I visited Slovenia and Croatia this spring and I fell in love with the local white wines. So after a lot of searching we found three Croatian white wines. The first was a Grasevina from the Krizevci Vinyards. Then we tried a Traminac from Ilocki Podrumi. The final wine and the highest scoring white, earning a mere 12.6 was the Malazija from Koslovic Winery. Unfortunately, it would appear that the best Croatian wines are not exported, as none of them came even close to matching the local versions! At \$11.95, the Grasevina will remain on my "buy" list.

By the way, I would challenge anyone to pronounce the names of these wines (even sober).

Because we did not really like the red Croatian wines we decided to change countries and chose France and the Cote Du Rousssillon region of Languedoc.

The first wine to be sipped was called Syrousse, and with a score of 14 overall, it was the favoured wine of the evening. At a cost of \$13.75, it is tempting to purchase a case. The other reds were Cuvee Constance (\$16.75) and Mas Janeil (\$18.75) So, once again the least expensive wine hit the top spot! I think that the Crepes Suzettes that accompanied the french wines were the biggest hit of the evening.

They being Scottish and me being a cheapskate we decided the wines shouldn't cost more than \$10 a bottle. The Millichamps heard of the proposal and said "count us in".



With trepidation at the possibility of incurring Michael's wrath we then put the suggestion to the entire Grapenuts offering what we called a rogue wine tasting for those like us who had missed the cut on the



other two events. It was "rogue" because the basis was different. At \$10 a pop for each wine we decided that the hosts would supply the wine and asked the guests to "pay their way" with a small plate of either cheese or sweets. I have to say our Probus members haven't grasped the concept of small!

We quickly filled up the spaces and set up house for 14 - as I prepared the spreadsheet I noticed I had used 17 lines. I had omitted our co hosts and one other in

my count! We squeezed another 3 places and measured how many samples we could get out of a bottle - we could do this - just!

Winning wine was an Yvon Mau Merlot with an average score of 14.7 and at a price of \$10.05 - credit to the Wallhouses for introducing us to this wine at their July tasting.

Thanks to all who participated and made it such a great night and special thanks to Michael for his encouragement.

Probians enjoy a good laugh - here are just seven

There are many different kinds of laughter. There is the kind that leaves us clutching our bellies and gasping for air and there is the kind that barely escapes our lips in restrained titters. Here are a few of those giggles and where they came from.

Chortle

The chortle is defined as "a gleeful chuckle,". This term was coined by the beloved and whimsical wordsmith Lewis Carroll in his 1871 novel, Through the Looking-Glass, as a blend, or portmanteau, of the words chuckle and snort.

Guffaw

A guffaw is a loud, unrestrained burst of laughter; as a verb, it means "to laugh in a loud and boisterous manner." The word is of Scottish origin and is thought to be imitative of the sound of such laughter. Titter


Far from a belly laugh or a hearty guffaw, a titter is a

nervous or self-conscious laugh. To titter is "to laugh in a restrained, self-conscious, or affected way as from nervousness or in ill-suppressed amusement." The origin of this word

is unclear, but etymologists point to the Swedish term tittra meaning "to giggle." Giggle

Before English speakers were tittering, they were giggling. A giggle is "a silly spasmodic laugh, especially with short, repeated gasps and titters, as from juvenile or ill-concealed amusement or nervous embarrassment."









The origins of the word yuk, as in "The audience really yukked it up at the movie," are a bit of a mystery. The similar-sounding yock, theater slang for "a laugh," appeared in the US in the late 1930s.

The word snicker, meaning "to laugh in a half-suppressed, indecorous or

disrespectful manner," has been around since the late 1600s. Like many words on this list, this one is thought to be imitative of the sound of laughter.

Heehaw

If the words we use to describe laughter are any indication, it would seem that a good episode of laughter reduces us to our animal natures, leaving us howling, snorting, and roaring. The term heehaw entered English in the early 1800s as a term for the loud braying sound a donkey makes and shortly thereafter picked up the sense of "a loud laugh reminiscent of a neighing horse."

All in all - a lovely sunny day - a good laugh and a nice dinner. Hope everyone enjoyed themselves.







Our 2017 Trip - Austria and Her Neighbours By Joanne Millichamp - Trip Coordinator

ext year our tour will visit 5 countries in Europe, Austria, Germany, Liechenstein, Switzerland and Slovenia. This is a delightful, restful program featuring a 2-centre stay in Austria, beginning at our first hotel in the city of Bregenz, located directly on Lake Constance in the green foothills of the Alps. We will tour the Bregenz Forest, an area of rolling hills and picturesque villages. We will ride on the steam railway and enjoy a visit to an authentic cheese maker and sample some cheeses from the region. Hi-lights in Germany include a visit to the island city of Lindau, with its 12th century tower and medieval walls plus the Zepplin Museum and the fairy tale castle of Meersburg. In Liechenstein, the 6th smallest country in the world we will tour the capital city of Vaduz. Then on to Davos, Switzerland, a winter sports mecca, known for the annual World Economic Summit.

We then travel on a panoramic train across Austria to their 2nd largest city Graz. Visits in this area include the town of Piber, which is home to the Lipizzaner Stud Farm. These beautiful white horses are the oldest breed in Europe. Our tour includes the museum, stables and we will enjoy petting the 30-40 foals born each year.

After a tour through the Styria region (known as the green heart of Austria) we will enjoy lunch of local wine, cheeses, and cold cuts at a cozy tavern. Later we visit the Castle of Seggau with its 300 year old wine cellar and enjoy more sampling.

Our last country is Slovenia where we see the city of Maribor and enjoy a walking tour of the medieval city centre. Then its on to Ljubijana, the capital. Ljubijana is a beautiful small city with a pretty little river meandering through the town. The city centre is also car-free. Our final stop is a visit to a family owned chocolate factory where we will tour the production process and then enjoy a chocolate aperitif, sample chocolates and finish with coffee and schnapps and a take home souvenir.

The dates are October 10th to 20th, 2017. The weather in October is typically warm during the day, in the mid-teens with cool, crisp autumn evenings.

The cost is \$3,695 per person, which includes your flights, all breakfasts, all dinners and 2 lunches. Airport departure taxes are extra. The single supplement is \$400.00.
