




and subsequently equalling Joanne's club record score of 28! Megs had an unbeaten run.

D'Stillers Teary-Eyed

he D'Stillers first meeting of the new year was held a the home of Suzanne and Wayne Herder. There were seven members in attendance as we sat down to indulge in a selection of Scottish, Irish and Canadian Whiskies.



The overall winner of the evening was 'Writers Tears'.

This Irish Whiskey is made from unmalted and malted barley in a traditional Irish pot still. "Ireland has been blessed with great poets, and playwrights down through the centuries. However, most, if not all of our great writers suffered from writer's block. Many sought comfort and inspiration from "The Water of Life". It was said that when an Irish writer cried, he cried tears of Whiskey.

Writers Tears is a salute to these great writers with a style of whiskey that was popular in James Joyce's Dublin". It was a pleasant surprise that this whiskey came in first place.



The second whiskey of the evening was 'Wayne Gretzky No 99' Whiskey.

This was also a surprise, who would have thought that a rookie whiskey maker would come in second. This whiskey is made with locally-sourced grains that are individually distilled, matured and blended, then finished with premium red wine casks from the Wayne Gretzky winery, Wayne Gretzky No. 99 'Red Cask' Canadian Whiskey is made the Canadian way for a smooth, elegant and rich whiskey. I guess Wayne is trying for another record.

Number three whisky of the evening was 'Glenfarclas Lorne Scots Commemorative 12 Yr Old Single Malt Scotch Whisky'.

This particular Whisky was made to honour the 150 year anniversary of the Lorne Scots regiment for service to Canada with battle honours from 1812 until the recent foray in Afghanistan. Since 1865, Glenfarclas has been owned by just one family, the Grants, and is one of only a few distilleries in Scotland to be family owned and managed.

The fourth whiskey of the evening was 'Kilbeggan Irish Whiskey'

This whiskey was originally made in a small pot still distillery, the licence to distill dates from 1757, a copy of which can be seen in

the distillery. The distillery closed completely in 1957 and the building began to fall into disrepair. Twenty five years after its closure, the community of Kilbeggan restored the distillery and opened it to the public as a whiskey distillery museum. Kilbeggan is a double distilled whiskey which is unusual as Ireland is famous for triple distilling its whiskey.

The fifth and final whisky of the evening was 'Glengoyne' 12 yr Old Single Malt.

The distiller showcases the barley, as it is one of two remaining producers that use Golden Promise barley. The other is 'The Macallan', Golden Promise is considered to be of a higher quality, but much more expensive to grow than high-yield commercial strains. Although this whisky was our fifth choice it consistently score very high marks



in whisky tasting competitions. As we have often stated the 'Water of Life" is very subjective to ones own taste and opinion.

Thanks to Suzanne for hosting the DD's and thanks once again to the DD's for getting us home safe and sound.

Art and Intrigue

n January 9th, the First Edition Book Club met at Joy Castello's home to discuss "*The Lost Painting*" by *Jonathan Harr*. This book of mystery and intrigue surrounds the Italian baroque artist, Caravaggio (1571-1610).



The main focus of the book is the search for a lost painting called "The Taking of Christ." Harr

introduces the reader to the people involved with the search and intersperses modern events with details of Caravaggio's tumultuous life. Caravaggio was a brilliant artist and at the peak of his career many of his works were copied. Within 100 years of his death he was mostly forgotten until the mid 20th century when his popularity surged again.

In 1989 Francesca Cappallettti and Laura Testa, two graduate students from Rome, were researching the authenticity of two identical Caravaggio paintings of St. John the Baptist. While trying to determine which one was authentic, their search led to clues to another Caravaggio painting, "The Taking of Christ," which had been missing for hundreds of

years. Sir Denis Mahon, a Caravaggio scholar, helped the investigation along. In 1990 the painting was finally discovered in Dublin by Sergio Benedetti, an Italian art restorer. However, the story doesn't end there as potential dangers arise during the restoration process that threaten to destroy the painting.

The Lost Painting was entertaining and informative and the group rated it an average of 7 out of 10.

Mia, (Emma Stone) is a struggling actress working as a barista, Sebastian, (Ryan Gosling - a Canadian no less) is a frustrated jazz pianist who is determined not to sell out to his music; in true Hollywood fashion they take an instant dislike to each other, but eventually fall in love and encourage each other to pursue their respective artistic visions.

However, things begin to sour when Mia struggles to realize an ambitious onewoman theatre show.

Don't fret too much about the familiar storyline; instead marvel at the vibrant primary colours of cinematographer Linus Sandgren, the beautifully choreographed musical set-pieces and Justin Hurwitz's witty score – and the gorgeous production design.





As singers, Gosling and Stone wouldn't get far on "The Voice" but they don't put a foot wrong in the dance sequences – the scenes in which they waltz together in the Hollywood hills or literally take flight at a planetarium will melt your heart.

Let's be positive about negative

egative space is, quite simply, the space that surrounds an object in an image. Just as important as that object itself, negative space helps to define the boundaries of positive space and brings balance to a design.

In the graphic design of printed materials, where effective communication is the objective, the use of negative space can be crucial. When it comes to negative space logo design, designers incorporate multiple meanings into their logos. Visual illusions are a great way to use negative space. Here are some logos which demonstrate the use of contrast. Some you will recognize and decipher immediately, others you may need a little help.







My theme (appropriate for a very chilly evening) was: Winter Wines (with enough heft to warm your heart and tummy).

The final wine that I served was the appropriate way to finish - a really "warming" wine - Taylor Fladgate Late Bottled Vintage Port (2011). And the reaction confirmed my choice. When we scored, a chorus of "Twenty!" rang around the room, with a final score of 18.7 (a new world record for Grapenuts!) However as Port is really in a class of it's own, I felt it would be unfair to our top-rated Red to bump it to second place and relative obscurity (15.8 is a pretty impressive score).


