
Elvis The Wonderful World Of Christmas: Graceland Edition:



he D'Stillers met at Al Finnie's place where we were treated to a Whiskey Tasting by a representative of Beam Suntory, Michael Sheppard, who gave us a taste of six Suntory brands. We had a wonderfully enlightening evening with Michael at the helm, however we did not deviate from the D'Stillers way of rating the whiskies, following are our results.





The winner of the evening was *Auchentoshan* a Scottish Single Malt. Since we tasted this whiskey in Aug 2016 we will not comment again. Score of 78%

Coming in second was *Killbeggan Whiskey* an Irish Blend, this is in the January's 2017 report. Score of 77%.

Tied for Third place was *Suntory Toki* a Japanese Whiskey and Jim Beam an American Whiskey. Score 76%.

Next was *Knob Hill* an American Whiskey. Knob Hill whiskey was named after Abraham Lincon's boyhood home. Score 72%.

Last but not least was *Canadian Club 100% Rye Whiskey*. Score 70%.

In January of 2014, it was announced that Jim Beam would be purchased by Suntory Holdings Ltd., a Japanese group of brewers & distillers known for producing Japan's first whiskey. Suntory agreed to acquire Jim Beam, Maker's Mark, Teachers Highland Cream and Laphroaig distillery Scotch whiskies for approximately \$13.62 billion

Thanks to Al for hosting and to Barb for entertaining the DD's and supplying the goodies and coffee at the end of the evening. Thanks also to the DD's for a safe journey home.

Although Michael, the Beam Suntory Representative, is a young man he enjoyed hosting our group. We know this from the very nice email he sent to Barb when she thanked him for the evening. This a testament to the fact that even 'old' men can be a lot of fun:



Quilting term of the month: *Batik Fabrics* – Made by covering an area of fabric with wax or other substance to prevent the dye from penetrating into that area. Hot water is used to remove the wax. Batiks usually have a high thread count so you should use a #12 Microtex needle.


Our next meeting will be at the home of Wendy Stringer on Monday, July 3rd. Anyone who quilts or would like to learn are welcome to join our meetings.




The movie takes place during WWII (note- Wonder Woman was created during that time period by a Psychologist, Dr. William Marston. He also created the lie detector


Useful: Of course they are, but all things in moderation.









