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Our July Speaker Canada: No longer the Cold White North



THE REAL PROPERTY

David Philips has been employed with Environment Canada's weather service for over 40 years. His work activities relate to the study of the climate of Canada and to promote awareness and understanding of weather and climate in Canada. He has published several books, papers, and reports on the climate of Canada, including several essays in The Canadian Encyclopedia, and seven books including two bestsellers: *The Day Niagara Falls Ran Dry* and *Blame It On The*

Weather. He is the originator and author of the *Canadian Weather Trivia Calendar*, the most popular calendar sold in Canada, and now in its 25th year. For nearly ten years he wrote the Weather-wise column in the Canadian Geographic magazine. David frequently appears on national radio and television as a commentator on weather and climate matters. David is a fellow of both the Royal Canadian Geographical Society and the Canadian Meteorological and Oceanographic Society. He has been awarded the Patterson Medal for Distinguished Service to Meteorology in Canada, the Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada, the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Medal, and has twice received the Public Service Merit Award. David is the recipient of two honorary doctorates from the University of Waterloo and Nipissing University. In 2001, David was named to the Order of Canada.

Our August Speaker

y name is Jayne Leang and I am the Director of Business Relations with the Bob Rumball Canadian Centre of Excellence for the Deaf (BRCCED). I have been with the organization for 14 years in various operational roles ranging from

administrative to human resources to a more outward focus in my current role. I develop relationships that help us achieve synergies; especially as it relates to awareness, accessibility and enhancement or expansion of our services. Most recently, I have worked with the Ministry of Labour, the ROM, and the Canadian Mental Health Association of Ontario in developing videos in American Sign Language to help educate the Deaf community. I also led a 4 year provincial HR Best Practices Committee with a mandate to professionalize the Intervenor Services Sector and develop standardized HR tools. This committee reported to a provincial Steering Committee I participated on along with the Ministry of Community & Social Services with the purpose of implementing a 4 year Intervenor Services HR Strategy with a goal to improve services for Deafblind consumers.

Discussion Topic: Stories to help instill a better understanding of the services we offer and the population we support; including our social enterprise – The Range. Our individuals supported are all Deaf but that is not why they need support. They are with us because they are seniors who cannot live on their own, or adults new to Canada with no English or American Sign Language knowledge, or people with developmental disabilities or mental health issues where their families cannot continue to give them the 24/7 support required. The common denominator is they are all Deaf; some are also Deafblind. We create an environment where one did not exist before. Deaf Culture thrives and those receiving supports from us can feel a part of that larger community creating inclusiveness that results in acceptance and ultimately independence. Individuals have come to us from all over the country and our team of professionals help them strive towards the highest quality of life they can achieve in a communication-rich environment.



For most activities, a deposit from our Probus Club is required to confirm the date of an event or to confirm the "group rate" for the event. Members' cheques for these events are cashed very soon after each meeting and used toward the deposit to the venue. Starting this month if you need to cancel out of an activity **you will need to find a member to replace you**. We will be happy to refer you to someone on the wait list.

Some activities do not require a deposit from Probus to confirm the date of an event or group rate. The cheques from members for a no-deposit activity are deposited at the beginning of the month that the event is to be held. If you need to cancel before the first of that month, you can get a refund or most likely your original cheque back.

e are rolling along merrily, as we pass our fourth anniversary. I've lost track of the number of bottles we have drunk, and the average litres of wine each of our Grapenutters have consumed since we started.



Liz and Cliff Read: Theme: Portugal Revisited

This past March, Ron and Joanne Millichamp, and Liz and Cliff Read happened to be in Madeira around the same time. Both couples realized that it might be fun to use Portuguese wines as a theme for a Grapenuts tasting since we enjoyed all the wines available on this trip. The Millichamps hosted almost as soon as they returned and the Reads were scheduled in early June. We decided that it could be interesting to compare the exact same wines in two different tasting sessions. Were the wines going to score the same or were there going to be differences depending on the night and tasters?





The results are in. It turns out that the scores reflected major differences. Aveleda Vinho Verde scored the highest for the whites on June 4th with an average score of 13.28. It was the least favourite of all the whites

scored during the March tasting. For the red wines we scored Bons-Ventos Lisbona as our favourite with an average score of 14.3. Once again this was in contrast to the wine chosen as best during the March tasting. Based on this sample then, one can

determine that the judging of wines seems to be highly subjective perhaps dependent on mood, accompanying food, or even time of year when consuming the wine. Liz and Cliff also provided this group of Grapenutters some of the flavours of Madeira. There were the usual cheeses and

fruits to go with the wines as well as Bolo de Caco (a Portuguese version of garlic bread baked on a stone), chorizo sausage prepared on an open flame cooker, and Pasteis de Nato (Portuguese egg tarts) for dessert. And of course both Madeiran wine and cake were sampled as well. After these two evenings of samplings, we were all very aware of why Portugal is considered one of the top wine producing regions of the world.

Ellen and Chris Wallhouse: Theme: Ontario Election Day – Wines with "Flowery Themed" labels (to match election promises).

Even though it was election day we held a wine tasting at Chris and Ellen's. Because of the election we selected wines with flowery themed labels to match the speeches that would come later. Of the whites a



Moscato from Fresh Beginnings in Ontario \$12.95 got the highest average with a Pinot Grigio from Pelee Island Ontario \$ 14.95 coming second and a Sauvignon Blanc Reserve from Santa Carolina Chile \$12.95 rounded out the select. All the wines scored within 1 point average of each other.

For the reds a Beaujolais by George DuBoeuf from France \$14.20 scored highest with a Cabernet Sauvignon by Lindeman's Bin 50

from Australia \$12.30 second and lastly a Cabernet Sauvignon Reserve by Santa Carolina from Chile \$13.95 The reds scored less than 1 point apart. Quite an enjoyable evening.

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Auriel Halliday and Don Evans: Theme: Horizontal tasting – Three Rose's and three Pinot Noirs.

On June 13th, twelve thirsty wine tasters gathered for yet another fun evening. Our Guests were Lorraine Randall, Petra Halk, Pamela Lester , Judith Mitchel, Marion and Keith Flowers, Kathy Schmit and Bill Wilcocks, and Jim and Michelle Tischirhart. Don and I decided to do horizontal tastings on three Pinot Noirs and three Rose's. As so often happens our favourite Rose was the least expensive. It was from Italy.....Barone Ricasoli Albia Rose. The Pinot Noirs were pretty similar. All pleasant, but not outstanding. As you can see from the photos we had a fun night with some delicious food....

though I say it myself.






NEW GROUP

rilogy Book Club's choice for our June meeting was the mystery/thriller Beach Strip written by Burlington author John Lawrence Reynolds. The book is a tautly crafted murder mystery with an eclectic cast of shady characters, cynical police officers and feisty heroine Josie who's bent on proving that her police detective husband, Gabe, did not commit suicide, all against the backdrop of the present day Burlington beach TRILOGY

Many of our group remembered the beach strip from their youth when the area was in its heyday and a destination location in its own right. Linda Green provided some recent photos when she and husband Ken scouted out the strip that helped fill in the gaps when our imaginations faltered.

A determined and plucky hero, Josie's investigations into her husband's death leads her into some unsavory locations where she interviews a 'mob boss', confronts a crusty homicide investigator who is convinced that Gabe's death was a suicide (case closed!) as well as portraying the wilted lives of a cast of beach strip residents.

The book gives us access to police protocols in investigating a death of 'one of their own' and Josie's own initiatives in thwarting a rush to judgement about the outcome. The

ending, in true Agatha Christie fashion, is a shocker and provides a satisfying conclusion, raising the reader's estimation of Josie's sleuthing skills (even though we didn't particularly care for her rather erratic and impulsive personal life choices).

Our group scored the book at a 7.5 to 8 level and the fact that it was written by a local author featuring a local setting gave the book extra merit.

Besides a lively discussion about the book itself, our host Ella Dolan enriched our meeting with a tour of her amazing backyard garden that was both instructive and aspirational. Did you know that male mulberry bushes don't produce berries? Who knew! Five Scotch and One Canadian By Chris Strachan - Convenor

he June meeting of the D'Stillers was held at the home of Lorrette and Pete Shermet with seven members in attendance. Pete supplied five Scotch whiskies and one Canadian whisky for our tasting pleasure. We rated them as follows:



The winning whisky of the evening was 'Scallywag' a blended whisky bottled by 'Douglas Laing' at 46% alcohol by volume (ABV) at a cost of \$73.20. it was rated at 79%. Independent bottler and blender extraordinaire Douglas Laing is responsible for some of the most unique bottlings and blends around, including 'Timorous Beastie', which refers to Rabbie Burns poem 'To a Mouse' and 'Big Peat' a heavily peated whiskey. As an example the unique label for 'Scallywag' shows a rather startled Fox Terrier his ears pricked and his monocle blasted off having just experienced his cask strength namesake for the first time.

Number two with a rating of 75% was 'Sir Edward's' blended scotch whisky with a ABV of 40%. This whisky is not sold in Canada but is available in duty free stores worldwide. As an example this whisky can be purchased as cheaply as \$12 per liter in Thailand. Despite its price, this is still a very good whiskey. Believe it or not, this whisky is bottled in France.

The third whisky of the evening was 'The Dalmore' a 12yr. Old Single Malt with a score of 72%, a ABV of 40% at a cost of \$88. The saying 'fortune favours the brave' has never been truer than for Colin of Kintail. As a sign of gratitude for saving his life, King Alexander III awarded him the lands of Eilean Donan and the motto 'Luceo Non Uro', which translates to 'I Shine, Not Burn'. But most importantly Colin of Kintail and his Mackenzie clan were given the right to bear a 12-pointed Royal Stag as their crest. This crest is featured on the Dalmore bottles. An interesting fact about Dalmore is that they distill a whisky for cigar lovers called Cigar Malt Reserve.

The fourth whisky was 'Glen Breton Rare' Canadian singe malt whisky. This whisky scored 71% with an ABV of 43% and costs \$80. Since water is arguably a whisky's most important ingredient the Glenora Distillery uses water for MacLellan's Brook; the purest and cleanest source of water in Cape Breton. The Glenora Distillery has the distinction of being the first distillery to produce single malt whisky in North America.





There was a tie for fifth place at 69% between 'Hankey Bannister' original blended scotch and 'Bruichladdich The Classic Laddie' a single malt. With an ABV of 40% 'Hankey Bannister' can only be purchased outside of Canada at Duty free stores. This whisky can be purchased as low as \$17. This whisky was very popular in London's west end in the 18th century and was sold in 'Gentlemen Only' clubs. An interesting fact is that it was one of Winston Churchill's favorites whiskies.

'Bruichladdich The Classic Laddie' has an ABV of 50% and costs \$64.50. This whisky stands out on the shelf of the LCBO as it is in a light blue package, as is the bottle. Bruichladdich

whisky is one of the few unpeated whiskies made in Islay, a place we visited with our friends on our May vacation.

Our thanks to Lorrette for entertaining the DD's and for the lovely coffee and desserts. Thanks once again to the DD's, for getting us all home safe and sound.



Yet Howard carries more than the physical and mental scars inflicted by his captors. Something happened in Hong Kong, a secret that he has carried for nearly two decades. Ethie, inquisitive and fearless, will be the one to work her way towards the truth and help her father come to terms with the past.
