

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

He also serves as Vice President of the Canadian Association of Bariatric Physicians and Surgeons.

### The State of Milton

olin Best is a life-long resident of Milton and works locally as an independent property appraiser valuing residential properties for various lending institutions and other purposes. In the community, he has been involved with a number of organizations including the Milton Jaycees, Rotary Club, Air Cadets, Milton BIA, Chamber of Commerce, Milton Santa Claus Parade



Committee, and various Parents' Councils at local schools that his children have attended. He was first elected in 1980 as a local councillor for Ward 2 which at the time included all the urban area. He served on a number of local council committees and was elected to Regional Councillor from 1994 to 1997. In 2006, he was elected to be the local and regional councillor for Wards 2 & 4, and in 2010 and 2014 he was reelected to represent the new wards 2,3,4,5 north of Derry road and serve on multiple committees. In the recent 2018 election, he was elected as the Regional Ward 1 councillor. The new Ward 1 is made up of the former wards 2,3, and north part of ward 8 north of Derry Road and west of Ontario St. and consists of the original urban area of Milton, Scott neighbourhood, and the entire Nassagweya and former Nelson township areas north of Derry road. Colin states: "It is also the biggest, and I believe the BEST ward of Milton ( okay I am a little biased ) where I have lived and worked the majority of my life in".

He will speak to the current and future state of Milton.


Lorrette Shermet, and Michael Hooker also provided more details about their individual clubs.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Richardson hires Mia to cook and clean for her busy household, thinking that Mia will benefit from the extra income and Mrs. Richardson covertly feels that she is doing a good turn for a disadvantaged family.


Worlds collide as Pearl interacts with the 3 older Richardson teens and Mia and Izzy Richardson, the black sheep, forge an unexpected relationship. The plot unfolds with a series of twists and turns that reveal a not-so-perfect outcome.




also played bridge. Ginny Gallipeau was the winner with Elinore Shannon coming second. Bonnie got her dollar back.



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

#### Hushed

ur January event was hosted by Gerry Kennedy, who played for us the CD "Hush" by cellist Yo-Yo Ma and vocalist Bobby McFerrin, and introduced each track with brief comments. "Hush" is a mixture of classical and many other music styles, blended in an absolutely unique way.

Bobby McFerrin (born in 1950) is truly a "one of a kind" vocalist – I wouldn't call him a "singer" – he's so much more! His voice has more in common with strings or wind instruments or percussion – has to be heard to be believed! Bobby (a ten-time Grammy Award winner) is known for his unique vocal techniques, such as singing fluidly but with quick and considerable jumps in pitch—for example, sustaining a melody while also rapidly alternating with arpeggios and harmonies—as well as scat singing, polyphonic overtone singing, and improvisational vocal percussion. He has frequently collaborated with other artists from both the jazz and classical scenes. His " Don't Worry, Be Happy " was a No. 1 U.S. pop hit in 1988.

Yo-Yo Ma is the best-known classical cellist in the world today. He was born (of Chinese parents) in Paris in 1955, moved to New York City when he was seven, and has performed as a soloist with orchestras around the world. He has recorded more than 90 albums and received 18 Grammy Awards. In addition to standard classical repertoire, he has recorded a wide variety of folk music from many parts of the world, traditional Chinese melodies, Argentinian tangos, and Brazilian music.

For us listeners the record was a real revelation; we found it hard to believe that Bobby's voice actually could produce the variety of sounds that we were listening to! Beautiful and incredible.








### Local and European Lagers






required some mending and a new binding. She asked our advice on whether to

he first meeting of the D'Stillers on January 2, 2019 was held at the home of Anna and Chris Strachan with all eleven members in attendance. I supplied five whiskies for our tasting pleasure and they were rated as follows:













The winner of the evening was 'Highland Park Viking Honour' 12 yr old single malt with an ABV (Alcohol by Volume) of 43% at a cost of \$64.95. In 1984 a Highland Park whisky was the only whisky to score a rating of 100% by the regular tasting team of the 'Scotsman', the national newspaper of Scotland.

In second place was 'Bowmore' 12 yr old single malt with an ABC of 40% at a cost of \$57.95. This is a super price for an excellent whisky. Bowmore is the oldest distillery on the island of Islay located on the west coast of Scotland.

The third whiskey of the evening was 'Tomatin' 12 yr old single malt with an ABV of 43% at a cost of \$59.95. Around eighty per cent of Tomatin's whisky goes into blended whisky, including its own brands of Antiquary and Talisman. Recently, the distillery has begun to produce a lightly peated single malt called 'Cu Bocan' which is produced 1 week a year at the distillery.

The fourth whiskey was 'Glenfiiddich' 12 yr old single malt with an ABV of 40% at a cost of \$59.95. Glenfiddich in Gaelic means 'valley of the deer', hence the stags head on the bottle. In 1961 the company made a bold move in electing to use the now world famous triangular bottle.

Last but not least was 'Cattos' a 12 yr old blended whisky with an ABV of 43% at a cost of \$54.80. In the long and rich history of the Scotch

Whisky industry, few have played a more pivotal role than the legendary James Catto. One of the first to master the art of blending, this most enterprising of individuals launched Catto's Rare Old Scottish Highland Scotch in 1861.

Thanks to Anna for hosting the DD's and supplying the treats. Thanks once again to the DD's without whom we would not have a safe drive home. The February meeting on the 6th February 2019 will be held at the home of Marion and Keith Flowers.

## Off to Flying Start

#### Crawfords host Judgement of Milton!

llen and Paul Crawford's tasting on the 7th January had as it's theme "Judgement of Milton" – a competition of wines from different countries, inspired by the 1976 "Judgement of Paris" competition. This was a wine competition organized in Paris on May 24 1976 by Steven Spurrier, a British wine merchant, in which French judges carried out two blind tasting comparisons: one of top-quality French and Californian Chardonnays (White) and another of Red Bordeaux wines from France and Cabernet Sauvignon wines from California. A Californian wine rated best in each category, which caused surprise as France was generally regarded as being the foremost producer of the world's best wines. Spurrier sold only French wine and believed that the California wines would not win. (The event's informal name "Judgment of Paris" is an allusion to the ancient Greek myth.)

- Best White: Whitehaven Sauvignon Blanc, New Zealand, LCBO 308288, \$19.95, score 14.9;
- Best Red: Josh Cellars Legacy Red Blend, California, LCBO 507467, \$18.95, score 16.1.

#### Megs Shellard: LCBO "Festive Choice" recommendations

- Best White: Deinhard Riesling Moscato, Germany; LCBO 543975, \$12.95, score 12.5;
- Best Red: JJ McWilliam Shiraz / Cabernet Sauvignon. Australia, LCBO 16741, \$10.35, score 13.6.




