
the success he has already achieved in net zero buildings is showcased in his most recent projects across the GTA, including Burlington, Markham, and Milton.

#### Road Trip

hree members of the Piece Makers went on a road trip to Guelph on Monday, Dec. 3rd. Our first stop was to **Horizons Quilting**. The owner, Joan Hug-Valeriote is a retired teacher and a quilt-artist who has been making bed-quilts and art-quilts for almost 40 years and over the years has received numerous grants to lead quilting workshops in schools in Ontario. She showed us the quilt projects she brings into the classroom and explained that the students make their own pillow and participate in producing a "Linus" or community quilt, often from recycled clothing and other textiles. They will make and keep their own "needle book", so that they can carry on at home after the program.





We proceeded on to the **Triangle Sewing Centre**, a small fabric and sewing accessories store that provides sewing machines and classes for the beginner & the professional, as well as notions, fabrics, lighting, sewing cabinets, and irons. They also provide expert service to all makes and models of sewing & embroidery machines including Janome, Bernina, and Brother. After we made some small purchases, it was now noontime, so we asked for restaurant suggestions. We were directed to the **Uptown Grill**, a family owned breakfast and lunch restaurant located on Woolwich Street in Guelph, Ontario.

Once our appetites were sated, we continued on to the popular **Len's Mill Store**. Here I scored a great Christmas sweater for Stephen to wear to the Probus Christmas Luncheon - what a find!. I had never been in a Len's Mill Store before and was amazed at the quantity and variety of fabric, as well as other gift items. 

This was a great way to start the Christmas season!
















#### The Book of Awesome

Pasricha's recent OneBook, One Milton 2018 appearance at the FirstOntario Arts Centre Milton which helped to give context to the book's meteoric rise as an international bestseller. Pasricha started his blog after two pivotal events in his life; his divorce and the suicide of a close friend. He explained that identifying awesome things in his life served as his way of coping during an emotionally depleting time.

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Books are something social a writer speaking to a reader - so I think making the



#### D'Stillers Plus Guest



ince four of our members were on vacation in November it was agreed there would be no D'Stillers meeting, needless to say the D'Stillers were quite happy to get back into the swing of things in December.



The final meeting of the D'Stillers for 2018 was held at the home of Kathy Schmidt and Bill Willcocks on December 5th with seven members in attendance. Bill supplied five whiskies for our tasting pleasure. We rated them as follows:

The winningest whisky of the evening was 'Port Eskaig' a 14 yr. Old Single Malt with a 45.8% alcohol by volume (ABV) at a cost of \$105. This was the first whisky the D'Stillers tasted that evening and it scored well with a range of 79 – 85%. There is no Port Eskaig distillery, it's widely held that in general this wonderful brand is sourced from the Caol Ila distillery. Word on the street, however, is that this limited edition 14 year old is, in fact, a heavily peated Bunnahabhain whisky from the Bunnahabhain distillery.



Number three was 'Monkey Shoulder' blended Scotch Whisky, with an ABV of 43%, costs \$65.45. 'Monkey Shoulder' is a blend of three Scotch single malts, Glenfiddich, Balvenie and Kininvie. The name comes from the old days when the malt was tuned by hand which often caused a repetitive injury. This led to one shoulder hanging lower than the other one, hence the name Monkey Shoulder.

Number four was 'Ninety Nine Proof' a Canadian blended whiskey, with an ABV of 49.5% at a cost of \$99. The Great One's third spirit release is a small batch whiskey matured in bourbon barrels for three years and finished in wine cask (cabernet sauvignon) for 100 days.

Number five was '**Scapa Skiren**' Single Malt Scotch with an ABV of 40% at a cost of \$78. Scapa is the second most northern distillery in the Orkney islands of Scotland. Skiren means 'bright skies' in Old Norse. Scapa Flow is famous for its sheltered harbour, where at the end of World War One 52 German ships were scuttled.

Our thanks to Kathy for hosting the DD's and supplying the treats. Thanks once again to the DD's without whom we would not have a safe drive home. Another new member has joined the D'Stillers, Frank Dawe, hopefully, Frank can join us for our January meeting and Marg can join the ladies (DD's) for a chat etc.

The Wednesday, January 2nd 2019 meeting will be held at the Strachan home as we once again start our rotation.

















#### **Choral Music**

soka Yapa hosted our December meeting, and chose the theme of "Spanish Music". Asoka started by mentioning the influence that the Moorish (Islamic) rule over southern



Spain had on the country (even after the Christian re-conquest in 1492), including the music.

We started with some short medieval pieces of music, first from Northern Spain showing the Christian European influence; then the south with the Moorish sound very evident.

Jumping forward several centuries to the early 1800s and Fernando Sor, whose music was strictly "European" in tone. At that time the Moorish influence was mostly confined to the music of the Gypsies (too "common" for many people), which eventually became the music of Flamenco that we hear now.

Several of the best-known classical music pieces from the 19th and 20th centuries that we think of as "Spanish" were by non-Spaniards – e.g.: French (Bizet's Carmen), Russian (Rimsky-Korsakov's Capriccio Espagnol). Asoka played us three such pieces.


Then we finished up the musical side with several pieces by two 20th century Spanish composers who really showed the Moorish musical influence in their own fiery compositions: Manuel de Falla and Joaquin Rodrigo, who died in 1999 aged 97. He became completely blind at 3, and composed in Braille!

Overall, a really varied and fascinating afternoon! And to finish, sangria and Spanish-themed desserts. Our next meeting on 15th January 2019 will be at Gerry Kennedy's home.




