two-time winner of the Stephen Leacock Medal for Humour, Terry Fallis is the awardwinning author of six national bestselling novels, including his latest, **One Brother Shy**, all published by McClelland &

Stewart. His seventh novel, **Albatross**, is due in bookstores in August 2019.

The **Best Laid Plans** was the winner of the Leacock Medal for Humour in 2008, and CBC's Canada Reads in 2011. It was adapted as a six-part television miniseries, as well as a stage musical.

The **High Road** was a Leacock Medal finalist in 2011. **Up and Down** was the winner of the 2013 Ontario Library Association Evergreen Award, and was a finalist for the 2013 Leacock Medal. His fourth novel, **No Relation**, was released in May 2014, debuted on the Globe and Mail bestsellers list, and won the 2015 Leacock Medal. His fifth, **Poles Apart**, hit bookstores in October 2015, was a Globe and Mail bestseller and was a finalist for the 2016 Leacock Medal. **One Brother Shy** was released in May 2017 and became an instant bestseller. The Canadian Booksellers Association named Terry Fallis the winner of the 2013 Libris Award as Author of the Year.



Terry earned a Bachelor of Engineering degree from McMaster University

(1983) where he became engulfed in university politics and somehow persuaded the undergraduates to elect him President of the Students Union.

In 1995, he co-founded Thornley Fallis with Joe Thornley, a full service communications consulting agency with offices in Ottawa and Toronto. Terry also created and co-hosted more than 200 episodes of the popular business podcast, Inside PR. For more than 25 years, Terry has counselled corporate and government clients on various fronts including crisis communications, media relations, issues management, marketing communications, public opinion polling, public affairs, stakeholder relations, etc. He has also written speeches for CEOs, cabinet ministers, and other community leaders.




Escarpment Probus Picnic by Pat Vogt - Social Chair

he Trilogy Book Club met on May 8th at the home of Louise Ellis to discuss Lisa Genova's book "Inside the O'Brien's". The O'Brien's, an average American family, live in Charleston a suburb of Boston. Joe, 44, is happily married to Rosie and they have four adult children. He is proud of being a police officer



and loves his job and life in Charleston. As we get to know the family Joe has an uncharacteristic reaction of anger, throwing a heavy frying pan against the wall. His rages gradually increase over time and the family becomes increasingly concerned with his changes in behavior. He finally visits their Doctor and learns that he has Huntington's disease, a disease with no recognized treatment or cure. The author, an American neuroscientist, takes the reader on a journey of this progressive and fatal hereditary disease informing the reader of its physical manifestations as well as the emotional and psychological changes that occur to Joe and to his family and friends as the symptoms gradually increase in severity.

The members of the group found this book to be informative and thought provoking. The author provides useful information about the disease and the changing reactions of the O'Brien family members. We had a lively discussion about the reality of the disease and the psychological as well physical effects of the disease. The group rated the book an 8 out of 10.

ive members of the Piece Makers met on Monday, May 6 atGrace Church hall. All five members brought their recent and not so recent projects.


Carol Anne showed us her pillowcases that she made for the upcoming fundraiser at her church.

Judy brought three baby quilts destined to help out her grandson's school fundraiser. We all loved the elephant quilt.


Wendy brought two more squares for her shop hop quilt.




Johnny Walkers Explorers' Club Voted Winner

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The winner for the evening was Johnny Walkers Explorers' Club **'The Spice Road**' with an Alcohol by Volume (ABV) of 40% at a cost of \$52.00 and a score of 76.2. The Spice Road is one of three Johnnie Walker releases from their Explorer's Club Collection, originally released for the Travel Retail market, hence they are only found in Duty-Free shops. As you might expect from the name, this is an enjoyably spicy whisky, packed with cinnamon and nutmeg notes.

Number Two is **'Signal Hill**' a Canadian blended whiskey with an ABV of 40% it costs \$40 and had a score of 73.3%. Signal Hill, St John's Newfoundland is where ships were given safe passage into harbours. It is where fires were lit to signal between villages. It is where the world's first transatlantic wireless signal was received in Morse Code and the place of the first non-stop transatlantic flight carrying airmail.

In third place was **'Proper Twelve**' a blended Irish whiskey with an ABV of 40% at a cost of \$30 with a score of 69.9. Proper Twelve is made by Bushmills for UFC star Connor McGregor who is the founder, chairman and majority owner of Proper Twelve, so named because he's from the Dublin suburb of Cremlin meaning that 12 is the area code in Dublin where McGregor grew up.

Fourth **Gibson's Finest 12 yr Old** is a Canadian whiskey with an ABV of 40% it costs \$34.95 with a score of 69.9. Gibson's Finest is a blend of grain whiskey, corn, with rye and barley aged in both exbourbon and new barrels. Founded in Pennsylvania by Scottish immigrant John Gibson as a rye whisky but chased into Quebec due to Prohibition, Gibson's now calls the Hiram Walker distillery in Ontario home.

Last but not least was '**Aquavit**' made in Newfoundland with an ABV of 40% at a cost of \$35 and a score of 55%. Aquavit is the first spirit ever produced in Newfoundland that has been fully grown and legally distilled in the province. The ingredients come from coast to coast; the barley was grown and dried in Cormac, the honey is from Tuck's Bee Better Farm in Grand Falls, pristine spring water comes from Springdale, the peat and juniper from Clarke's Beach, Newfoundland and a dash of savoury from Mt. Scio in St John's.

Thanks to Suzanne for the lovely goodies, her ice cream cake was especially delicious. Also, our hats off to the DD's for getting us home safe and sound.



what can be labeled as organic. Generally, grapes need to be grown without the use of toxic pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, or synthetic fertilizers.

Each part of the tasting session (one white and one red) had two organic and one non-organic wine of the same variety. We wondered how our Grapenutters would compare the

Islands of the Mediterranean

n September 2020 we will be visiting three islands located in the Mediterranean Sea: Sicily, Malta, and Cyprus. We will finish out trip in Athens, Greece.

- Sicily is the largest of the Mediterranean Islands. We will visit the capital city of Palermo, then drive along the north coast to Catania, our home for the next 3 nights. Visits include the beautiful hilltop town of Taormina, with its breathtaking views of the Bay of Nexus. We will take a cable car up Mount Etna (the only active volcano in Europe) and also enjoy a wine tasting with lunch in that area. A trip to Syracuse on the southeast coast is followed by a high-speed ferry, which takes us to our next stop, the island of Malta.
- Malta has played host to many cultures over the years, Roman, Greek, Arab and of course British. A tour of the capital city of Valletta is first on the agenda where we will enjoy views of the Grand Harbour from the hilltop Barrakka Gardens. A highlight of our trip will be a cruise on a Turkish Gullet to the island of Gozo where we will have the opportunity to swim or snorkel in the crystal clear waters of the Blue Lagoon. The ship offers a wonderful hot and cold buffet lunch and complimentary wine and beer. We will also visit the medieval town of Medina. This tiny nation also produces quality wine and we will have an afternoon wine tasting before proceeding to the airport and our Emirates Air flight to Cyprus.
- Cyprus is the 3rd largest island in the Med and since 1964 has been divided into two parts, the Turkish Republic (north) and the Greek part known as the Independent Republic of Cyprus (south). We first tour Famagusta, a medieval city. The walls, built by the Venetians are 60 feet high and 30 feet thick. After lunch we visit the Protaras and Cavo Greco area to enjoy the spectacular views on the way to Asia Napa. On another day we will drive through citrus groves and vineyards to the ancient city-kingdom of Curium, with free time to wander around the old fishing harbour. A full day excursion takes us to the capital Nicosia where we will visit both the Turkish and Greek sides of the city. We will also visit Buyuk Han, a former Caravanserai (hotel or inn). With its 67 rooms, this Han is a typical example of Ottoman architecture.
- Our last stop is Athens, the capital of Greece. Our tour includes an overview of the modern city with striking contrasts to the remains of its glorious past. We will visit the Acropolis and its many monuments, including the Parthenon. A walking tour of the Plaka area, one of Athens' oldest and most picturesque neighbourhoods completes our tour. Our final dinner will be held in the rooftop garden restaurant of our hotel where we can enjoy an amazing view of the lights of the city and the monuments of the Acropolis lit up at night.



The dates of the trip are September 11-24, 2020. The cost is \$5,790 per person. The single supplement is \$1,590. Included are all meals as per the brochure, hotel accommodation, ship, ferry and ALL gratuities for guides and drivers. Not included are airport taxes, currently \$680. Please ensure you have trip cancellation insurance.

n April, Michael Hooker entertained us to a video performance of Jacques Offenbach's Tales of Hoffmann (based on three short stories by the German fantasy and horror writer E. T. A.

Hoffmann, 1776 – 1822). Hoffmann, drinking in a tavern, tells three tales of his unsuccessful loves:

• To Olympia, who turned out to be a mechanical doll, with disastrous results;

• To Antonia, who has a disease that will kill her if she sings too much. A charlatan doctor conjures up a vision of her mother who encourages to sing, with the inevitable results – she dies in Hoffmann's arms;

• To Giulietta, a Venetian courtesan, who is bribed to steal Hoffmann's reflection; then she abandons him for a rival.

At the end of the opera - in the tavern, Hoffmann, now thoroughly drunk, is abandoned by his current love, Stella. The performance, a telecast by New York's Metropolitan Opera, was beautifully sung, acted, and staged. Tales of Hoffmann is certainly one of the most entertaining and melodic operas.

Ten members of Mozart and Friends attended the Milton Philharmonic Orchestra's concert "May the Fourth Be With You", at the Milton Arts Centre, on (of course) – the Fourth of May, as part of a sold out

audience. Many thanks to Jeanne Reid who organized it for us. This concert was the music of John Williams, one of the greatest American composers of all time. He has worked on over 100 films throughout his 60-year career. We heard the music themes from Star Wars, Indiana Jones, Superman, Raiders of the Lost Ark, Close Encounters of the Third Kind and the theme from Jurassic Park. It was a wonderful concert, enjoyed by all. The orchestra conductor took questions from the audience and we learned a lot about the workings of a symphony orchestra. e.g. harp has 47 strings.

Our group looks forward to the five Milton Philharmonic concerts in the Fall of 2019 and Spring 2020. November 29 will be a Celebration of Scottish Music with the Georgetown Pipe Band and ending with Verdi's Requiem on May 2, 2020.
