



Our September Speaker

D'Arcy Jenish

Historian. Biographer. Journalist.

he first bombs exploded in Montreal in the spring of 1963 and over the next seven years there were hundreds of bombings, dozens of banks robberies, thefts of dynamite and weapons, six deaths and finally, in October 1970, the kidnappings of James Cross, a British diplomat, and Pierre Laporte, a Quebec cabinet minister. The perpetrators of all these acts were members of the Front de Liberation du Quebec and resorted to terrorism to achieve their goals of a sovereign and socialist Quebec.

It is now nearly fifty years since the kidnappings and the October Crisis of 1970 and more than half a century since the FLQ appeared and launched wave after wave of terrorism. The Making of the October Crisis: Canada's Long Nightmare of Terrorism at the Hands of the FLQ is the first full account of these events. In researching the book, author D'Arcy Jenish conducted dozens of interviews, read contemporary newspaper accounts in French and English and was given access to dozens of previously unpublished police documents. These include reports of bombing incidents, the confessions of bombers and kidnappers, and witness statements, all of which shed new light on these events.



Juno Beach Centre Association

he Juno Beach Centre Association (JBCA) is a Canadian non-profit charitable corporation that is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors based in Burlington (Ontario), Canada. The JBCA owns and operates the Juno Beach Centre in Normandy, France.



The core purpose of the JBCA is to:

- Provide a tangible and fitting memorial to Canada's participation in the Second World War and recognize the emergence of Canada on the world scene;
- Remember and commemorate the sacrifices made by all Canadians who were part of the Allied victory in all theatres of war and at home; and
- Educate adults and children of today and future generations about the role of Canada in preserving the freedoms we are privileged to enjoy today.

Pam Calvert is a retired Canadian History teacher who taught for the Halton District School Board for 25 years. She has been a finalist for the Governor General's History Awards for Excellence in Teaching and she received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal for her remembrance work with students. Pam has a passion for the remembrance and commemoration of Canadian soldiers in the First World War and Second World War. She has taken six student battlefields tour to France, Belgium and Italy. The highlight of these tours has been the visit to the Juno Beach Centre Museum in Normandy, France and to the local D-Day cemetery where her students recognized soldiers they had researched. Her volunteer role as the Education Committee Consultant with the Juno Beach Centre Association in Canada started in 2007 and involves the Summer Institute Teacher Tour, the JBC Fellowship Program, community outreach, promoting the Juno Beach Centre through the use of social media and conference.



George Bernard Shaw's play "Pygmalion". The play hit Broadway in 1956, to universal acclaim, and the film version (which we viewed) was released in 1964, winning eight Academy Awards. 
It was "OK"

Whiskey Tasting Usurps Poker!

he Aug Meeting of the D'Stillers was hosted by Barb and Ted Chliszczyk. Ted supplied five whiskies for our tasting pleasure they were rated as follows:





The Winner of the evening was 'Grangestone' a Single Malt whiskey with a score of 76.9% and an Alcohol by Volume (ABV) of 40% at a cost of \$29 US. This whiskey is unavailable in Canada. Grangestone is a bottler and blender based in Surrey, England, owned by William Grant & Sons (who produces Glenfiddich and Balvenie, among others) via a subsidiary. This 12-year-old malt comes from an unnamed distillery in the Scottish Highlands (though we'd venture a guess that it probably comes from one of the owner's distilleries, most likely Kininvie). It is aged for at leas



comes from one of the owner's distilleries, most likely Kininvie). It is aged for at least 12 years in oak casks before bottling.





Number two was 'GlenDronach Original 12 yr old' Single Malt with a score of 75.7%, an ABV of 43% and costs \$80. GlenDronach Distillery was established in 1826 by a consortium of farmers and local businessmen. The GlenDronach Distillery patiently matures its single malt whisky in superior quality sherry casks. Their distilling methods may be old-fashioned, but they prefer to look on them as handcrafted techniques created through nearly 200 years of tradition.



Third of the evening was 'The Balvenie Double Wood 12 yr old' Single Malt with a score of 72.4%, an ABV of 43% at a cost of \$100. 2018 marks the 25th anniversary of The Balvenie DoubleWood, aged 12 years. This milestone is not only a testament to the craftsmen who have dedicated their working lives to making Balvenie the handcrafted way but to the skill of their Malt Master, David Stewart, who throughout his 55 year career has changed the face of Scotch, work which earned him an MBE in 2016. To make The Balvenie DoubleWood, David Stewart takes whisky that has spent at least 12 years in traditional whisky casks, American Oak ex-bourbon barrels and hogsheads, and moves it to Spanish oak ex-Oloroso sherry casks for an additional nine months to allow the whiskies from individual casks to "marry".



The fourth whiskey was 'Laphroaig Quarter Cask Islay Single Malt Scotch Whisky' with a score of 65.9%, an ABV of 48% at a cost of \$90. One either loves it or hates it. Over the years the D'Stillers have been tasting various Laphroaig whiskies, the consensus is that most of them do not like heavy peated, smokey, seaweed tasting whiskey. Fortunately, it is one of my favorites. Jim Murray's whiskey bible gave this whiskey a score of 96 out of 100 which is a score reserved for the best quality whiskies.



Last but not least was 'Auchentoshan 12 yr old' Single Malt with a score of 61.7%, an ABV of 40% at a cost of \$61. This whiskey has been tasted 3 times by the D'Stillers, it was third in 2016, first in 2017 and now it has come fifth this time around. Perhaps we are influenced by the particular whiskies being tasted on any particular night.

Thank to Barb for sacrificing her "Poker" game, keeping the DD's entertained and for supplying the lovely desserts. Thanks also to the DD's for once again getting all of us home safe and sound.
