

Mozart and Friends go Hawaiian

We are continuing with our Zoom musical get-togethers twice a month; only a few signing in, but those who do are enjoying the varied musical offerings.



Last Wednesday our Zoom session was "A Medley of Melodious Mozart"; ten short pieces to show the variety of Mozart's music. The final piece was part of his Requiem Mass, the last thing he wrote, and not completed when he died. Those of you who saw the movie or the play "Amadeus" will remember the deadly hatred of Mozart's musical rival in Vienna, Salieri, and how Salieri (in disguise) commissioned the Requiem, and succeeded in working Mozart to death (at 35 years of age). There was a rumour to this effect going around Vienna after Mozart's death, but there was no truth to it. In fact, Salieri was often a strong supporter of Mozart's works, and later in life was a renowned teacher of several famous composers, including Beethoven, Schubert and Liszt. The Requiem was finally completed by Franz Sussmayr (a pupil / colleague of Mozart). It was actually commissioned (anonymously) by Count Franz Walsegg-Stuppach in memory of his dead wife; known as an amateur composer the Count liked to commission musical works from others and present them as his own! I've listened to a few of Salieri's musical works, and these suggest that he was an extremely competent and inventive composer, head and shoulders above most of his contemporaries.



Quilt Challenge

After the show and tell portion of the meeting, we discussed several possibilities for our next quilt challenge. We decided on a BOM placemat project using an Ice Crystal quilt pattern that can be created using templates or paper piecing.


Quilting Terms of the Month:

BOM – Block of the Month

Stash Buster – Completing craft projects with the deliberate intention of reducing your stock of materials.

Temperature quilt – A quilt made from a range of colours. The colours are assigned to temperature ranges, and the blocks or pieces are made with the colours that correspond to the weather of that day or week. Some use the average temperature for the day and others use the low and high temperatures.

Carol Ann offered her backyard as the venue for our meeting on Sept. 1st. For this meeting, each member is tasked with deciding on their colour and fabric choices for the BOM challenge. We will discuss possible border patterns at the meeting and review the first block pattern. For those members that have limited stashes, Diane will bring the group fabric bin for you to shop.




