As we've all been prevented from "in person" travel for most of this year, our two December Zoom Musical Offerings took us on an international odyssey.




Asoka Yapa presented "Dreaming of the Zambezi"* – Music by Hennie Bekker. Born in South Africa, Bekker, who is a self-taught keyboardist, moved to Canada in 1987 and became involved with Canada's music industry. He partnered with Canada's nature sound recordist Dan Gibson, and they have composed and produced many nature albums that are a staple of museum shops across North America. In this presentation, Bekker drew on his African roots to paint a vivid musical picture of the land, people, and wildlife, complete with lots of animal, bird, insect, and nature sounds of Africa. Fascinating! Asoka started with a six-minute video by Bekker "The Heart of Africa". Here's a link to the YouTube video, if you'd like to taste the waters!

*At over 2500 km, the Zambezi River is Africa's fourth longest. It rises in Zambia, flows through Namibia, Botswana, Zimbabwe, and Mozambique before emptying into the Indian Ocean.

I hosted our second musical travelogue, with music around Christmas as my theme. Most were from the British Isles; others from USA, Poland, Germany, and of course Canada. My objective was a musical picture of the whole Christmas season, both religious and secular (where all the fun stuff is!). And I surprised our listeners by staying away from most of the usual Christmas music, and concentrated on pieces that were "off the beaten track", e.g., Shape Note carol singing in Alabama, African-American song to greet the first light on New Year's Day, a carol composed by King Henry VIII (both words and music), a Wassailers' song in Welsh, the Carol "Silent Night" with it's original accompaniment of guitar, horn and strings, a Quebec "Reveillon" dinner song, and a home-made video of Newfoundland Mummers singing and having a real blast!

Author Yangsze Choo set this novel in 1930's Malaya which is now Malaysia. At that time Malaya was a British colony and a temporary haven for many Britons who left their native land to serve in a professional capacity or to escape from their families or indiscretions.



The novel pulls us into a world of servants and masters, superstition and dreams, sibling rivalry and forbidden love, among several other themes. Tips and Tricks

She told us that her shoulder surgery went well and she is hoping to be able to quilt in the New Year. Wendy had completed the quilting of her Snowman table runner using fabric with Merry Christmas writing. Judy showed us a black/yellow/white top made from

strip sets. She also showed us the fabric she is auditioning for her next project. Carol Ann showed us her pieced Cardinal table runner and completed cushion. She also showed us her pieced Ice Crystal blocks #4, 5, 6, and 7. Louise told us that she now has an "Add-a-Quarter" ruler and hopes to start piecing the Ice

Crystal blocks. Diane showed her completed placemat using the Ice Crystal block #2. She also showed the completed thermometers that will be part of her grandchildren's temperature quilts. She then shared an article entitled "What can I do with a 5" square?"

Quilting terms of the month:

Auditioning – To try things out-to test, to consider-to see what will work the best and which choice will move you closer to your goal. It is recommended to use a design wall so that the

choices can be viewed from a distance.













Design Wall – A vertical surface often covered with batting or felt used by quilters to lay out fabrics and blocks for a quilt before stitching them together. Design walls are an excellent way to try different layouts before making a final decision on your quilt.

Strip Piecing – A technique of sewing fabric cut into strips together accurately and quickly and then cutting those fabric strip sets into new blocks and designs. A classic version of this is Seminole Patchwork.

We will be starting the New Year with a meeting on January 5th via Zoom. We will start the meeting with our usual Show and Tell then Diane/Wendy will share a video showing the Disappearing Nine Patch Tips and Tricks by Deb Tucker. Anyone interested in quilting, consider joining the group.
