Islands of the Mediterranean

After a couple of postponements due to Covid, we are optimistic that our trip will happen next year from May 26th to June 8th, 2022.

Sicily is the largest island in the Med, and Catania the second largest city, where we will stay for three nights. Visits in Sicily include cities large and small, seafront drives, beautiful vistas and visits to ancient temples, theatres and cathedrals. A highlight will be a visit to Mt. Etna, Europe's most accessible volcano where we will also enjoy a wine tasting.

We travel to Malta by high-speed catamaran and stay in the capital Valletta for four nights. We will tour the main sights, such as the cathedral, Grand Harbour, and the three cities built by the Knights of Malta. Built in medieval times, the town of Mdina, with its narrow alleyways, will be a full day visit. We will also enjoy a cruise on a Turkish Gullett and visit the two surrounding islands, Gozo and Comino, and the Blue Lagoon. And guess what, we have another wine tasting.

A short flight takes us to the island of Cyprus, the 3rd largest in the Med, where we stay for the next four nights. Cyprus has been divided into two areas since 1964, the Turkish area in the north and the Greek area in the south, with UN peacekeepers separating the two. We will have a full day excursion to Nicosia, the capital, which is the only divided city in Europe. We will tour both areas, visiting a cultural centre, cathedral, and a caravanserai. We also visit Famagusta and its mosque, Salamis, and Curium.

We have a morning flight to Athens, where we will enjoy a full day tour including Constitution Square, Presidential Palace, Plaka and many others. We visit the Acropolis with its many monuments including the amazing Parthenon. Our final dinner will be held at a roof top garden with panoramic views over Athens.

There is an optional 2 night/3 day post tour in Athens.

Prices are \$6,090 per person and the single supplement is \$1,590. This includes all flights, accommodation, and ALL gratuities. Not included is the airport tax, currently \$730. This trip is first come, first served for club members only at this time.

Please ensure you have travel insurance that covers you for medical and trip cancellation.



It was great to see different people on the podium this time around! Our next trivia night is July 20th so if you are at all interested in playing please do so. It is always lots of fun!



Wheat beer originated in Germany during the Middle Ages and contains between 30 and 70 percent wheat malt. Characteristically they have a tangy flavor, a pale hue and strong aromatics. Wheat beers are fermented in the bottle causing them to be bubblier than other beers and making them appear naturally cloudy.



We sampled three different beers – Paulaner Hefe Weissbier, Belgian Moon, and Side Launch Wheat Beer. Our members enjoyed all three of these beers and the results were surprisingly close. In the end Belgian Moon was the favourite of the group by a slim margin.

American Jazz / Spanish Flamenco

Asoka Yapa treated us staid Mozartians to a literal "wake up", an "Evening at the Cotton Club – Harlem, New York", as it was in 1936; one of the high spots of Black Jazz and Swing. Here's what we listened to:



- Roy Eldridge, the King of Swing, with his Big Band. Eldridge was second only to Satchmo as a trumpet virtuoso, and led a wicked swing band that rocked joints all over America.
- Ella Fitzgerald What's there to say? Just listen to her. Here's a taste "Old Devil Moon" https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rHZb8F97FhE
- Joe Williams, the Prince of the Blues, with Ben Webster and his Big Band.

After that, to paraphrase a singer from a later generation, we were "All Shook Up"!!!!

For our second June Zoom, I presented a 100% Spanish program by composer Manuel de Falla (1876 to 1946). Much of his music was strongly influenced by the Andalusian tradition of Southern Spain (think: "Flamenco"). Three masterpieces:

- "El Amor Brujo" (Love, the Magician), an orchestral suite, with soprano in three of the sections.
- "Nights in the Gardens of Spain", for piano and orchestra. Falla's musical interpretation of three beautiful formal gardens, including the Generalife Gardens, the jasmine-scented gardens surrounding the Alhambra Palace in Granada.
- The ballet, "The Three-cornered Hat" a comedy about a Miller and his beautiful wife, and how they got the better of the lecherous old town magistrate. We watched and listened to the complete ballet, with a top-class Spanish Dance Company and great orchestra, complete with lots of castanets and foot-stamping. A treat for both the eyes and ears!




their best experiences! The pictures were great and many included notes about the subject. Of the 25 people who tuned in, many thought a river cruise would be a great next adventure!!

Summer BBQ

Now that Summer is here it's time to consider what can be made for a barbeque. I am including two recipes, one for BBQ spare ribs, which could also be used for chicken wings, together with a fiesta salad. It is quite possible that you already have your favourite recipes, but how about trying something new. The ribs are cooked in the oven to be used right away or stored for later use.



BBQ Spare Ribs

3 or 4 pork ribs 1 medium onion, sliced 2 tbsp vinegar 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce

2 tbsp salt 2 tbsp brown sugar ½ tsp paprika ½ tsp chili powder ¼ tsp black pepper ¾ cup ketchup

3/4 cup hot water

Mix all ingredients together. Place ribs on a baking sheet and cover with sliced onion. Bake at 300°F for 2½ hours or until meat is ready to fall off the bone.

Cut into serving pieces of two or three ribs. Crisp on the BBQ right away or reheat and crisp at a later date.

Fiesta Salad

1 pkg. mixed salad greens, with romaine 1 cup fresh or frozen corn 1 can black beans, rinsed, well drained 1 small onion, sliced

³/₄ cup radish slices 1 ripe avocado, peeled and chopped

1 large red pepper, chopped Salt and pepper

½ cup feta plus extra crumbled for plates

Dressing:

½ cup fresh lime juice
 ½ cup olive oil
 ¼ cup red wine vinegar
 ½ tsp minced garlic

2 tbsp finely chopped fresh cilantro or parsley

Mix dressing ingredients in a small jar, until combined.

Put all salad ingredients into a bowl, adding avocados when ready to serve. Toss with dressing, sprinkle plates with extra feta cheese.
