Why it's called Lake Superior . . . Pretty amazing. Did you realize how big this lake is?

LAKE SUPERIOR FACTS

Lake Superior contains ten percent of all the fresh water on the planet Earth.

It covers 82,000 square kilometers or 31,700 square miles.

The average depth is 147 meters or 483 feet.

There have been about 350 shipwrecks recorded in Lake Superior

Lake Superior is, by surface area, the largest lake in the world.

A Jesuit priest in 1668 named it Lac Tracy, but that name was never officially adopted.

It contains as much water as all the other Great Lakes combined, plus three extra Lake Erie's!

There is a small outflow from the lake at St. Mary's River (Sault Ste Marie) into Lake Huron, but it takes almost two centuries for the water to be completely replaced.

There is enough water in Lake Superior to cover all of North and South America with water one foot deep.

Lake Superior was formed during the last glacial retreat, making it one of the earth's youngest major features at only about 10,000 years old.

The deepest point in the lake is 405 meters or 1,333 feet.

There are 78 different species of fish that call the big lake home.

The maximum wave ever recorded on Lake Superior was 9.45 meters or 31 feet high

Over 300 streams and rivers empty into Lake Superior with the largest source being the Nipigon River.

Lion: A Long Way Home by Saroo Brierley

Lion is a memoir by Saroo Brierley.

Saroo's early life was spent in abject poverty in rural India, his mother often leaving her children to fend for themselves. Saroo as a five year old cared for his baby sister,



and begged on the streets alongside his older brothers. On one occasion, Saroo pleaded with his older brother to take him along during the evening. Saroo became very sleepy and was left on a bench at the nearby railway station to wait for his brother. Upon awakening Saroo was startled to be alone and boarded a train. He found himself locked inside as the train travelled across India and he became lost. After wandering the streets of Calcutta for two months he was taken to an orphanage and then adopted by an Australian family, Sue and John Brierley. His childhood happy days are mostly skipped over. His focus shifts to his obsessive search via Google Earth to find his birthplace. He had been mispronouncing the names of local towns, but eventually spotted two landmarks that he remembered. As a man he travelled to India, retraced his steps to become reunited with his biological family. He discovered that he was mispronouncing his name which was Sheru, meaning Lion.

Our members gave the average score of 7. Some felt it was hard to believe a 5 year old would be able to cope and felt that some of Saroo's memories may have been misconstrued. However, often children do remember early traumatic experiences. Our own experiences cannot fathom how Third World families and children survive their poverty.

Both of Saroo's mothers show strength and compassion.

This is not fine literature rather a remarkable true life story.

Girl, Woman, Other by Bernardine Evaristo

Evaristo wrote the novel because she felt that black women were under-represented in British literature. The book follows the stories of 12 women, mostly black with a wide range of ages, backgrounds, sexual orientations and relationships. They were either directly or loosely connected to one another. The stories take place over several decades and highlight the lives of black women in British society.

The writing style of the book is quite unique in that there is limited punctuation and traditional sentence structure is not present. Many in our group found this free form writing to be challenging at first but found they adjusted to it as the stories unfolded.

While the book generated an excellent discussion, it is not for everyone. Some of our members enjoyed the stories and were comfortable with the writing style and some of the subject matter while others were not. Our group rated the book from a 5 to an 8 out of 10.

Tenors, Tenors and More Tenors!

At our November General Meeting, I talked about the two programs of American folk song roots that I put on for "Mozart and Friends" this summer. I thought this music would be interesting to many of you, as you probably grew up with some of



these songs, such as "Tom Dooley". And I offered to set up Zoom sessions for any of you interested in hearing them. If you are interested, email me and let me know which ones — mhooker10@bell.net. I'll also send you my notes on each presentation in advance. I have also zoomed for Mozart and Friends several other "folk" programs that may interest you:

- American Folk 1. Quick tour of major areas of American Folk Southern Appalachians, Black, music, Bluegrass, etc.
- American Folk odds and ends Wars, White Religious, Hard Times, Gold Rush, etc.
- Songs for the Christmas Season
- Music from the British Isles
- Sea Shanties and songs from the days of sail
- Australian Folk Songs

Asoka Yapa zoomed us Mozartians a fascinating program of "Seven Great Tenors of the 20th Century" – the oldest being Enrico Caruso (1873 – 1921), and the youngest Kenneth McKellar (1927 – 2010). The others were: Beniamino Gigli (1890 – 1957), Mario Lanza (1921 – 1959), Josef Locke (1917 – 1999), Jussi Björling (1911 – 1960), and Carlo Bergonzi (1924 – 2014).

Several of our Tenors lived and performed before true musical "high fidelity" came along, and to our "educated" ears, the sound quality of their recordings may affect our appreciation of their performance. But – every one of our Seven Tenors was really worth hearing! Thank you, Asoka!

Enrico Caruso was certainly the most famous tenor of his day, and even today would be regarded as one of the all-time "Greats", certainly on a par with Luciano Pavarotti! Here's a YouTube sample of Caruso singing Rossini's "La Danza", from 1912. Click here – just over 3 minutes.

For our second November Zoomer, I presented a program on Australian folk songs, some of them songs that I heard first when I was living in London in the mid-50s, and hanging out mostly with a mix of Aussies, Kiwis and South Africans.

These songs strongly reflect the "early days" of Australian settlement by the British, who originally used Australia as a new place to get rid of their surplus convict population (after their American colonies got uppity). Australia later evolved into a new source of meat, wool and grain for the Motherland. Most of these songs are about Bushrangers (highwaymen), the most famous being Ned Kelly, or work on the sheep stations (primarily shearing the wool crop) and cattle stations.

Here's a YouTube sampler – the UNOFFICIAL Australian National Anthem, "Waltzing Matilda", sung by Bert Lloyd, who was sent to Australia in 1924 at age 15, and spent the next six years working on sheep stations and wandering the country, while soaking up the songs he heard along the way. Click here – $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

The words and melody are a little different from the usual version; this one is "Waltzing Matilda" as originally written. It's based on a true story.

Quilting Terms of the Month:

- Bear Paw Theory is this block pattern would be a sign that slaves were on the right track to life-saving resources and shelter on their long trek to freedom in the days of the underground railway.
- Bleeding When the colour of one of the fabrics used, stains other parts of the quilt. It usually happens with dark fabrics and, in particular, reds. Unfortunately, if it happens, it is really hard to get the stains out. Some quilters will wash these fabrics with colour catchers or dye fixatives before piecing a quilt.

The long, long way home

Retiring from my 48 years in the printing and publishing profession, we decided to move down to a smaller house and up to a larger sailboat. Our plans came to fruition when we purchased our 27 foot Canadian Sailcraft CS27. The problem was, it was moored in Penetanguishene, Ontario. I don't know if you have looked at a map of Ontario lately, but Penetang is a 2 hour drive from anywhere in the GTA. In a moment, which can only be described as temporary madness, our son Mark and I decided to eschew the services of the boat transport industry and sail our lovely lady, Blithe Spirit, the long, long way around to Toronto.

This trip would mean setting off from Penetang, up the eastern side of Lake Huron to Tobermory, down the west side to Goderich, Kincardine and Sarnia. Through the St. Clair River and Lake St. Clair on to the Detroit River passing Windsor and Detroit and then flushing into Lake Erie. A stop at Pelee Island and then down the full length of Lake Erie arriving at Port Colborne in anticipation of transiting the Welland Canal. Once through there, it is plain sailing (no pun intended) across Lake Ontario to Bronte Outer Harbour, and home.

Rosalind declined to share the adventure, so Mark and I started the preparations. Charts (lake maps) for the waters to be traversed were purchased (required by law), a new chip for the GPS, a new VHF radio, new rigging, new lifelines and new batteries ensured that we would indeed finish what we started.

Leaving Penetang at 10:00pm and traveling north overnight, up the east side of the Bruce Peninsula allowed us to arrive at the break of dawn. The wise sailor leaves the port he knows at night and arrives at his destination, he doesn't know, during daylight. The 10 knot wind was right in our teeth and so we brought our trusty engine on line. The full moon rose at 1:00am to keep me company on my watch. Watches consisted of three hours on and three hours off with Mark taking the 9:00pm-midnight and 3:00am-6:00am watches and myself taking the

midnight-3:00am and 6:00am-9:00am. Getting out of my bunk at midnight, donning my lifevest, lifeline, VHF radio, flashlight and my ubiquitous iPod to do a job of work, this is not my idea of a holiday!

Once you are out of sight of land, you enter a strange beautiful world. The dark mast and sails wave and point at the starry firmament, trying to connect the billion or so white dots. Jupiter is the first planet to rise and shine followed by the weak red glow of Mars.

The isolation is palpable. How could there be such a vast body of clean, sparkling water teaming with life with two-thirds of the world thirsty?

No birds, no boats, no fish but plenty of biting flies, even 25 miles from the nearest land.

Leaving Goderich, with wind screaming in the rigging and the boat plowing into 9 foot waves, has us wondering about the soundness of our new home, but she showed us what she is made of and cuts the water apart with her sharp bow. We were told by an old salt that WE would give up before this boat would and that proved to be very true.

Thunder and lightning storms at night are frightening. Remember that the highest point on the lake is the top of our mast. Chains were wrapped around the mast and dropped over the side to placate the lightning gods. The storms drove by us leaving nothing but 6 foot waves and a sense of relief.

Lake Erie, now called "Lake Dreary" due to the lack of wind for 3 days. We were under diesel power for 72 continuous hours, adhering to our tough watch system. Eventually we were deposited at the mouth of that modern wonder, the Welland Canal. Rosalind joined the ship's company at this port.

Eight locks at \$25 each brought the trip through to \$200 which took 7 hours to complete its 27 miles. We were rafted-up with another sailboat and chatting, as one does, asking if they had been travelling long, fourteen years came the reply, that put our little 18-day adventure into perspective.

We learned a lot about our boat, ourselves and our environment and we are thankful that we have been brought to our home at last.

The long, long way home was 735 miles or 1,182 kilometres and took 18 days.
