



We Discovered Wine

It was a very warm evening, but a most enjoyable one! Our Sommelier, Oliver, took us through a discovery of old world wines to new word wines. There were numerous compliments on the wines and Oliver's presentation, the beautiful premises including enjoying the outdoor space – thanks again Theresa Spano for organizing that – and the individual charcuteries and the overall experience.

I think Paul captured it best with his recap:

"What makes a wine serious? Is a question that you may not have considered. It may be for you that any wine you are drinking is something you are serious about finishing but that would not be correct. You may think that seriously you need more wine to be able to put up with a dull meal, but this too is incorrect. For a wine to be serious when you taste it you get different sensations from the first sip, to the roll on your tongue and then another taste on the swallow. It is not just one simple taste that you stay with from the beginning. It is like the people we meet at PROBUS who you may bump into at an event and get an initial impression but over time and other interactions you realize that you are meeting an interesting person. There are lots of interesting people in PROBUS and lots of serious wine to be enjoyed."

The wines we enjoyed were: Two Pinot Grigios – Tavernello and Pelle Island, Yalumba Viognier, Cono Sur Viognier and finally Oggie Botter Primitivo and Smoking Loon Zinfandal which interestingly does not have a 'date' on the bottles. The cost of each wine ranged from \$10.95 and \$16.00 bearing in mind that the LCBO has been having fun with pricing fluctuations in recent months (and I'm sure it will continue)!

And yes, I actually did try the red!

Paul, thank you for your write up and to those of you who shared comments (and compliments with me). I also need to recognize Debbie Ceelan who helped me pour the wine – thanks for pitching in – and to Simone Serra and Debbie Ceelan who captured pictures throughout the evening. 





Wine tasting with Theresa and Dawn






April 6th Wine Tasting with the Strachan's

Ten lovely wine connoisseurs joined us for our April wine tasting. Since we have all been drinking and sampling wine for quite some time now, we decided to challenge our guests to identify the country the wine came from. We selected white and red wines from three countries and asked our ten wine connoisseurs to identify the country.



Well, it ended up being a bit of a disaster, but I found it quite fun as we drank the wine and tried to determine where it came from. It so happened that there were no winners; in fact, some correct scores ended up being changed, so they all ended up wrong, OK, maybe the odd one was correct.

In drinking order, the wines were from Italy, New Zealand, and France.

The winning Red with a score of 15.33 was Gerard Bertrand Pollinat Syrah from FRANCE - \$19.95

The winning White with a score of 13.79 was Sistina Pecorino Terre Di Chieti IGT from ITALY-\$15.95

The other wines are listed in rank order:

With a score of 13.83 Niro di Citra Montepulciano d'Abruzzo from ITALY at a price of \$17.95

With a score of 13.42 *Stoneleigh Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc* from NEW ZEALAND at a price of \$16.95 we saved \$2 on this one.

With a score of 13.13 *Chapoutier | Belleruche CdRhone White AOC* from FRANCE with a price of \$17.95

With a score of 11.58 *Stoneleigh Marlborough Pinot Noir* from NEW ZEALAND at a price of \$17.60. We saved \$4.35 on this wine, it appears the price was too good to be true as it scored poorly.

The winning Whisky of the evening was 'Islay Mist Scotch' with a score of 76.9 at a cost of \$34.95 (on sale for \$31.95) with an Alcohol by Volume (ABV) of 40%. This Scotch is a blend of Laphroaig and Speyside malts and grains.

Second of the evening 'Macallan 15yr Single Malt Scotch' with a score of 74.7 at a cost of \$278.00 and an ABV of 43%. Yes folks you read this correctly the price was \$278.00. Bill was given this whisky as a gift. We thought it was very generous of Bill to share it with us.

Third was 'Yellow Spot 12 Yr Old' with a score of 73.2 at a cost of \$130 and an ABV of 46%. This is an Irish Pot-Still whiskey matured in three types of oak casks.

Fourth was 'Mortlach 12 Yr. Old Single Malt Scotch' at a cost of \$104.95, with a score of 72.9 and an ABV of 43.4%. Mortlach is a little-known distillery that holds cult status among connoisseurs.

Last but not least was 'Clynelish 14 Yr Old Single Malt Scotch' with a score of 71.4 at a cost of \$104.95 and an ABV of 45.94%.

As you can see the least expensive whisky ended up a winner, it's all a matter of taste.



The Sanatorium by Sarah Pearse

The Sanatorium is a first novel for author Sarah Pearse. There is suspense, drama, mixed emotions and a sinister location. The setting is a former Tuberculosis sanatorium located high in the Swiss Alps that has been converted



into an upscale minimalist hotel. A blinding snow storm and an avalanche are the perfect backdrop for a 'locked room' mystery. The main character is a British detective who has had a tumultuous time in both her personal and professional life. Good Citizens Need not Fear

Trilogy book club members gathered on April 17th to discuss the award-winning book Good Citizens Need not Fear by Maria Reva.

The book is structured as nine stories, which share specific narrative connections. It is essentially a hybrid between a novel and a story collection. The first five stories take place in late-Soviet Ukraine, and the four last stories take place in Ukraine during the first few years after the fall of the Soviet Union in 1989.

The stories focus on a cast of characters in the backwater industrial town of Kirovka and how the years of Soviet rule had affected the lives of different generations.

This was a story of the absurd, as it revealed the trials, travesties and bureaucracy of a system in its last days and how it affected people from the perspective of a well-known poet, an orphan, an older retired couple, and a cast of others.

The characters were colourful, irreverent in many cases, but all showed a tremendous adaptation of living, and surviving in a system that made no sense in many ways. Living in an apartment block, for example, that didn't exist according to a government department, and as a result, not being provided with heat and electricity. We meet Smena who hasn't left her apartment in years and has been offering a black market product of forbidden Western music etched on discarded medical x-rays. Also there is Zaya, an orphan who is born with a cleft palate and achieves freedom by burrowing under the foundation of an ancient monastery converted into a state orphanage. She emerges years later to participate in a government endorsed Miss USSR pageant and expresses her indignation by spitting on the judges and again disappearing into the post-Soviet void.

To be honest, a lot of people didn't like this book and admitted it. While they gave the book a *meh* 6 rating (one gave an 8), by the time we were finished, a number of our members reconsidered and gave our discussion a rousing 10! Goes to show the power of a robust exchange of ideas.

On a sadder note, we learned of Trilogy book club charter member and friend, Shirley Matthews, who passed on last week and we extend our deepest condolences to husband, Ray, during this time. As well, we extend our heartfelt sympathy to Linda Green, who lost her mother recently after 21 months of respite care. Know that you are in our hearts.

Unusual Techniques

On Tuesday, April. 4th, the PieceMakers gathered together at Judy Nelson's condo for their monthly quilting meeting. Judy started our show & tell with a log cabin test block. Whoops! No picture as she wants to change a light and dark strip that were sewn in the wrong order. That is why we do test blocks! Diane Armand did



her homework – she has purchased a cutting mat, rotary cutter, ruler, Northcott canvas fabric, Jelly Bean kit in navy, and a Spill Quilt pattern. She is now all set to sew! Sandi brought a Tulip table topper and a Chandelier quilt made during a pre-cut online class using a 5" charm pack. Carol Ann showed us the Stack & Whack using 4 matches cut into triangles. It is amazing that all the blocks were made from the same fabric! She also brought her "Coat of Many Colours" quilt made from a shop hop expedition and embellished with her Mary Kay badges. Louise has completed two more of her Half Square Triangle blocks – soon she will have enough to turn them into a quilt! Judi Jones showed us her bed runner made from her Turquoise and Grey blocks.

Sandi demonstrated the Accordion Half Square Triangle technique. A great way to use up scrap material. Quilting Terms of the Month:

Accordion Half Square Triangles: This method is used to sew half square triangles in such a way that each one is a little bit different from the last (i.e. no one has a twin!) and there is absolutely no waste of fabric!

Stack & Whack: Process of matching up several repeats of a print so that they align perfectly and then cutting the entire stack so that each set of pieces is identical. You then rearrange the identical pieces to create a new design. Also known as a Kaleidoscope quilt.

Carole Windsor will host our next meeting on May 2nd. Bring your show & tell projects and any quilting questions you may have.

Clubs: Classical Music & Movies

April music goodies

Our first session took us deep into the Heart of Classical Music, namely: sonatas by Ludwig van Beethoven. A sonata is a substantial piece of music, usually with several sections (movements), played by one or two instruments only. Many



sonatas are for piano (one person); others are for violin, cello, clarinet, flute, horn, or other instrument, normally accompanied by piano (two people).

Beethoven wrote 48 sonatas in total, 32 for piano, others for horn, cello, violin. We listened to one sonata for each of these four instruments, which gave us an appreciation of the amazing scope and diversity of his music. Here's a quick tickler from Beethoven's Cello Sonata No. 3, third movement, played by Mischa Maisky (cello) and Martha Argerich (piano). Click here for video, two minutes.

For our second session, Asoka Yapa, just back from Sri Lanka (where he and Fiona deftly avoided our 2022/23 winter) treated us to a program of "Symphonic Finales" – the final sections of seven symphonies by six different composers: Anton Bruckner, Ludwig van Beethoven, Antonin Dvorak, Franz Schubert, Joseph Haydn, Camille Saint-Saens. As Asoka in his notes put it: "The finale of a fireworks display is where the organizers signal 'The end is nigh, but we'll make sure you won't forget it!'. The composers of last movements of many symphonies had much the same idea. Crudely put, they threw everything but the kitchen sink into the final moments of their compositions". Here's the finale from Beethoven's Fifth Symphony. It's eleven minutes long, so listen to as much as you feel like. Click here for video.
