
Aside from that, I did visit the farm with my son and his girlfriend and we met the "girls" and "boys". Alpacas have their own little personalities



## A Summer Picnic

The theme of this Grapenutters session was summer staycation. Therefore, all the wines and cheeses needed to originate in Ontario.

All the wines came from Creekside Estate Winery located at Jordan Station in the

Niagara region. There was a selection of summer wines – an unoaked *Chardonnay*, a *Sauvignon Blanc*, a *Rose*, a *Syrah*, and a *Cabernet Merlot*. As well, there was a new wine called *Twinkle* (a white wine with bubbles). Participants were provided with all the information about each of the wines – cost, alcohol content, sugar content and tasting notes. They were then asked to rank the six wines in the order of preference as to which of these wines they would buy if they were going on a picnic or just for summer sipping.

To accompany these wines all cheeses were from the Maple Dale Cheese Company near Bellville. There were *6 versions of cheddar* - a *1 year smoked*, a *4 year-old*, an *old cheddar*, a *dill and garlic*, a *Mediterranean style*, and a *Caribbean style cheddar*.

We followed the tasting session with a dessert and you probably guessed it - butter tarts, a particularly Canadian cuisine treat

When all was said and done the favourite of the night was the *Creekside 's Unoaked Chardonnay*. However, the LCBO does not stock it so the solution is easy. Next time you are in the Niagara area stop by Creekside and sample it. Who knows, you might want to buy a bottle for yourself. It has our recommendation.




# Appy Hour at the Strachan's

# July 6th Wine tasting at the Wallhouse's

An enjoyable evening was spent at the Wallhouse's sampling the wines in the photos, chatting, munching on various cheeses and crackers. Ellen served her pudding shots which has become a go to item. The wines we selected were low sugar and mostly on sale.

Whites consisted of two *Italian Pinot Grigios* and one *Ontario international blend* which had a Weight Watchers logo and nutritional label. The *On Point Crisp White* scored the lowest with the lowest price \$12.95, but was a pleasant wine for afternoon summer sipping with only 8.5% alcohol/vol sugar 2 g/l. Coming in second was *Bollini Pinot Grigio* with 13% alcohol/vol and 2 g/l sugar \$19.95 and first was *Folonari Pinot Grigio Delle Venezie* at \$16.95 12% alcohol and 5gl sugar.

The reds chosen were 2 *Argentinian Malbecs* and an *Italian Chianti*. Highest score went to an LCBO best seller, *Santa Julia Reserva Malbec* at \$16.00 14% alcohol/vol 2 g/l sugar. 
Thai House Cuisine up next by Joy Castello, Convenor




This was followed by three really lovely bottles of Shiraz from South Australia. If you guessed the country of the wine's origin then, guess what, another bucket hat appeared!

#### **The Heart's Invisible Furies** By Margaret Anne Fehr, Correspondent

"The Heart's Invisible Furies" by John Boyne is an emotionally charged novel depicting the life of Cyril Avery, who realizes he is gay in post-World War II Ireland. Born to an unmarried and disowned girl, Catherine Goggin, Cyril grapples with his identity in a society heavily influenced by the Catholic church.

The book prompted intense discussions on the powerful grip of religion in Ireland. Cyril's life is shaped by strict religious beliefs, leading to judgement and social rejection. He struggles to express his feelings for his childhood friend Julian, a heterosexual, fearing societal condemnation. Our Avril O'Reilly, who was born in Ireland, vouched for much of the veracity of the situations and judgemental attitudes described in the book.

Opinions on the book varied, with some lauding its ambitious storytelling and character development. However, explicit sexual content garnered mixed reactions, even as it highlighted the distinction between lust and meaningful love in Cyril's encounters with Bastien who later became his life partner.

The novel astutely contrasts attitudes toward homosexuality between Ireland and the Netherlands. It touches on issues like gay bashing, exemplified by the tragic incident in Central Park where Bastien is killed in the nineties, highlighting the LGBTQ+ community's struggle for acceptance.

The AIDS epidemic is thoughtfully explored, shedding light on different means of transmission and the associated stigma. Julian's concealment of his illness from his family in Ireland underscores the societal pressure and misunderstanding surrounding AIDS. *Continued* >>>>

"The Heart's Invisible Furies" is a powerful portrayal of Cyril Avery's journey to self-discovery and acceptance in a hostile environment. While the book received mixed ratings due to explicit content, its ambitious storytelling and emotional depth left a profound impact. Overall, it is a thought-provoking narrative that resonates with readers, recommended for its poignant portrayal of human experiences.

The resolution of the novel brought the characters together, offering hope for a more inclusive future, despite differing opinions within the book club. As for our straw poll, this book garnered a number of 9's and a few 5's and 6's and scored a definite recommend to other book clubs.



To mark the 156th Anniversary of my adopted country, I zoomed a program of 42 songs about and around Canada, coast to coast. Including songs by Stompin' Tom Connors, Alan Mills, Buddy Wasisname and the Other Fellers, Hank Snow,



Gilles Vigenault, Bobby Gimby, Gordon Pinsent – and a whole bunch more, including First Nations, Inuit, Metis. We all loved it, particularly because many of the pieces were completely new to us (even me,

discovered when I was putting the program together). Titles like "The Blackfly Song" by Wade Hemsworth, "The Mad Trapper of Rat River" by Stanley Triggs, "Newfoundland Anti-Confederation Song" sung by Alan Mills. First piece: by Tchaikovsky, written in 1882 in memory of Nikolay Rubinstein, his friend, mentor, and most ardent advocate of Tchaikovsky's music, who had died the previous year. Second piece: by Franz Schubert, his second piano trio, written in 1827, less than a year before his premature death at the age of 31. After his death, Schubert was largely forgotten, till his works were rediscovered decades later, and Schubert was finally recognized as a true musical genius in the same class as Beethoven and Mozart.

This July marks the third anniversary of us Mozartians using Zoom to musically (and very successfully) connect us during Covid. We've so far zoomed seventy-two programs! And when we again meet in person, we'll probably continue to uses Zoom sometimes, because of the tremendous choice of music available to us on streaming services like Tidal and YouTube.




aurits Cornelis Escher: 17 June 1898 - 27 March 1972, was a Dutch graphic artist who made mathematically inspired woodcuts, lithographs and mezzotints. Despite wide popular interest, Escher was, for most of his life, neglected in the art world, even in his native Netherlands. He was 70 before a retrospective exhibition was held. In the late twentieth century, he became more widely appreciated and in the twenty-first century he has been celebrated in exhibitions around the world. 
