





Chambers invites readers into the post-apocalyptic Pangea moon where robots have been unleashed from factories, leaving the circumstances that led to this societal upheaval to our imaginations. The dialogue between human and robot within the sci-fi backdrop takes a philosophical turn, contemplating the potential trajectory of our future in a world shaped by artificial intelligence.

A central point of discussion was the unique perspective of referring to humans as 'they' throughout the book, revealing a universal shift in sexual identities.

Our conversation delved into the intricacies of A.I. and the kind of world it might shape. "Who's building who?" became a question that echoed through our discussion, especially considering the 'Wild-built' robots are constructed by their mechanical counterparts using an array of re-purposed parts.
