The tour was very interesting and informative as we were able to walk along a production line to see the Rockwool product from its beginning as it comes from the furnace area on the pendulum to its final form. It is cut and packaged into either insulation or plant-growing medium used in the agricultural sector in greenhouses. The difference in the products was explained to us. It all starts with basalt rock from Ontario which is mixed with rock slag from the steel industry and melted. The staff who led the tour were very knowledgeable. A delicious lunch catered by Mint Leaves was provided by Rockwool. A very enjoyable day!

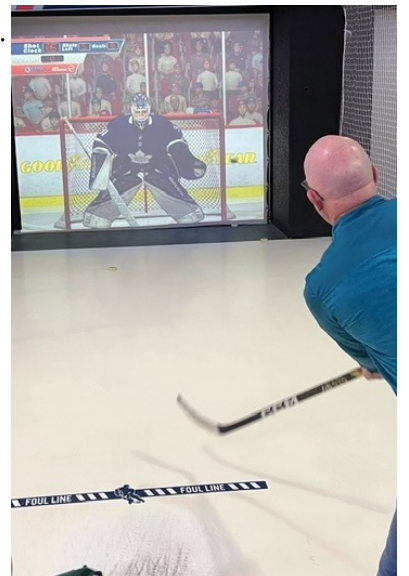
Hockey Hall of Fame

By the time the evening came to an end the snow had stopped but the first morning chore would be shoveling.

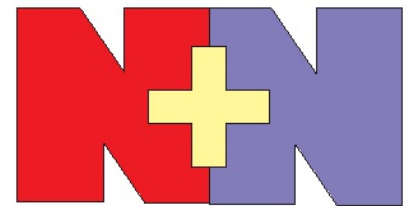

On the 6th of March 2024, Marg Jones and Frank Dawe hosted a gathering of the D'Stillers whiskey tasting enthusiasts. The evening commenced with a 10-year-old single malt Scotch Whisky called Robert Burns which originates from the Isle of Arran Distillers, in Scotland. It sells for \$60.25 per 700ml bottle and has 43% alcohol. It scored 77.9 out of 100.

Secondly we tried Jameson Black Barrel a 12-year-old Irish Blended Whiskey which sells for \$58.00 per 750 ml bottle and has an alcohol content of 40%. It scored 73.3 out of 100.

The third tasting was Chivas Regal a 12-year-old blended scotch whisky from Scotland. It sells for \$65.95 per 750 ml bottle and has an alcohol reading of 40%. It scored 70.9 out of 100.

Fourthly we sipped Glenlivet Master Distiller's Reserve which is a 12-year-old single malt scotch. This is a limited production whisky and not sold in Canada. A one-liter bottle sells for \$82.50 and has an alcohol content of 40%. Fortunately, we were all blessed with a dram of the golden highland nectar and as luck would have it, I was the benefactor of a second dram of the Master Distiller's Reserve. It scored a 73.9 out of 100.

The final sampling of the evening was Chivas Regal 18-year-old Gold Signature, a blended scotch whisky which sells for \$149.95 per 750 ml bottle and has 40% alcohol. It scored 73.3 out of 100.

The evening's preferred whisky proved to be the 10-year-old Robert Burns provided by Bill Willcocks which received a top score of 77.9 while second place went to Ron Millichamp's Glenlivet Master Distiller's Reserve at 73.9.



Third place was shared between Jameson Black Barrel, the 12-year-old Irish blended whiskey, and the 18-year-old Gold Signature Chivas Regal at 73.3.

What an arduous task it proved to be in appraising the evening's potions, but the results prove yet again, that the Probus D'Stillers are not swayed or influenced by advertising or price but judge their whiskies with integrity and honesty, by the glass!

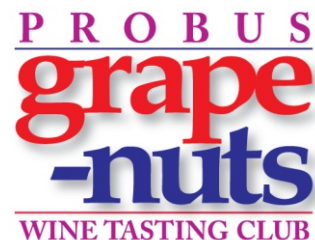

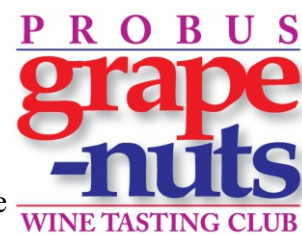

We bought one bottle of a less expensive Amarone (\$37.00) and then we added a bottle of home-made Amarone worth about \$7.00. It was really interesting to see how the three bottles compared to each other. The overall scores for those three bottles were as follows. The \$37.00 bottle received 14.2 overall. The home made bottle scored 12.2. The expensive bottle came out at 16.1. Moral of the story....the price is not always relevant .



Wine Tasting at the Millichamps

Ten hardy souls gathered at the Millichamp's for the first of March's wine tastings. There were two themes at play . The first being that the three white wines were all the same variety but from 3 different countries. The wine was Pinot Grigio. The first wine was Two Oceans from South Africa. The second wine was Jacobs Creek from Australia and the third wine was Mezzacorona from Italy. Interestingly the Jacobs Creek and Mezzacorona tied although they were quite different with one being quite sweet and the other, the Italian wine being quite dry. For the red wines we again sampled wines from three different countries. First was a Trivento Malbec Reserve from Argentina, second was Las Mulas Merlot Reserva from Chile and the third was Terrior D'Altitude Cabernet Sauvignon from France. They were all priced within a dollar of each other so one assumes, according to the LCBO that they were of equal value. One of our tasters guessed the correct variety of each red wine. The winner was the Malbec with the three reds scoring higher points than any of the whites. Obviously a red wine group. We had a lot of fun trying to come up with the correct answers. I must say that our taste buds have improved and we are getting quite good at picking out or having discussions on the various wines.



Grapenuts at the Shermets

On February 27 at the Shermets the tasting had kind of an obscure theme, "Wines under \$20.00 that scored high with wine critics! (88 or better)"

There were 11 wine aficionado's in attendance and as usual we started off the evening with the whites.

The first white was Ken Forrester Old Vine Chenin Blanc from South Africa at 13.5% abv and sugar at 2g/l. \$18.95. (critics score 92). Tasting notes indicated it was bone dry, floral and rich, with concentrated honeyed stone fruit and citrus, zesty acidity and underlying minerality. It scored 13.3 / 20.

The second white was The Ned Sauvignon Blanc, from New Zealand at 13% abv and sugar at 5g/l \$19.20. (critics score 90). Tasting notes say clear pale lemon colour, pronounced aromas of quince, citrus, herbs and spice; on the palate extra dry with medium-munus acidity and medium -plus body, flavours of quince, citrus and herbs with a mineral note. It scored 12.2 / 20.

The third white was Zenato San Benedetto Lugana from Italy at 13% abv and sugar at 6g/l \$18.95 (critics score 91). Tasting notes revealed that this fresh, juicy white wine shows hints of tropical fruit under the richly defined apple, peach, honeysuckle and citrus. A characterful minerality provides added depth and distinction. It was the highest score in the white category with 13.3 / 20.

The first red was Montes Reserva Cabernet Sauvignon, from Chile at 14% abv and sugar at 4g/l \$14.95 (critics score 88+). Tasting notes said dark ruby red colour; aromas of chocolate, prune, smoke with nuts and jam notes; dry, medium to full bodied, well balanced acidity and ripe tannins, with rich chocolate, prune, smokey oak flavours, notes of nuts and jammy fruit on the long finish. It scored 15 / 20.

The second red was Colossal Reserva 2019 from Portugal at 13.5% abv and sugar at 8g/l \$14.95 (critics score 90). Tasting notes say, walnuts, black and blue berry fruit, roasted sage and olives on the nose. It's medium bodied, fleshy and meaty, with ripe tannins and tasty finish. ready to drink now through 2025+. It scored 15.4 / 20.

The third red was Luccarelli Primitivo Puglia IGT from Italy at 13.5% abv and sugar at 11g/l. \$13.95 (critics score 88+). Tasting notes highlighted deep ruby colour, fruit forward bouquet of dark fruit- black plum/prune, spice, lifted chocolate and chestnut notes; medium to full bodied and dry with flavours that follow the nose, plus dark berry cocktail, and medium tannins that add balance. It was the highest score in the red category with 15.6 / 20.

It was interesting to note that the higher scoring reds were all under \$15.00 compared to the more expensive whites that came in just under the \$20.00 mark.

PieceMakers

All Day Quilting

Five members of the PieceMakers went on a mini retreat in March. We gathered at Diane's condo party room for 2 days of quilting and took the opportunity to work on unfinished projects and to learn new techniques.

For Show and Tell, Sandi brought a wall hanging made from a panel. She first embellished the candles, flowers and leaves with hand stitched embroidery, then machine echo quilted around the candles, flowers, and leaves.

The first day, Carol Ann demonstrated the foundation paper piecing (PP) technique using the word LOVE. Sandi and Dawn started their paper piece project using a star pattern that Carol Ann had previously sent to the ladies. Rosalind worked on a tree table runner that she wanted to finish quilting. Since Diane already knew how to paper piece, she took the opportunity to work on an unfinished Ice Chrystal placemat using the paper piecing technique but with freezer paper.



On the second day, Diane spoke about Stack and Whack (SnW) and demonstrated how to arrange fabric, cut identical triangles, and then sew multiple hexagons to make a One Block Wonder (OBW) quilt. Rosalind started her paper piece star, and Sandi and Dawn completed their stars. Isn't it amazing how different fabric, border, and sashing choices makes each block unique!

All in all, it was a great two days! Looking forward to our July 4-day retreat!

Quilting Terms of the Month:

- Foundation Paper Piecing - Technique of machine stitching your fabric directly onto paper. You can achieve perfect points if you position your fabric correctly and sew perfect straight lines.
- Freezer Paper Piecing - Technique of folding and ironing freezer paper to fabric and sewing beside the freezer paper. This ends up with perfect points (same as foundation paper piecing) but instead of having to rip paper from the seams, the freezer paper peels off the fabric and you can reuse the template.

Rosalind Jordan will be hosting our next meeting on April 2nd. Anyone interested in quilting whether it is large bed-size quilts or small table runners, consider joining the group.

DreadfulWater by Thomas King

For our March meeting the book selection was *DreadfulWater*, the first installment of a mystery series written by Thomas King. Mr. King is a winner of the Governor General's Award and the RBC Taylor prize among other awards. He is also a recipient of the Honour of Canada which celebrates his contributions to the country.

The main character is a former LA homicide detective named Thumps *DreadfulWater* who has retired from police work to be a photographer. He now resides on a First Nations reservation that is in the process of developing a new condo project. It is at this site that the first of a series of murders occur. Despite his attempts to stay uninvolved, he finds himself immersed in the investigation. This leads to some complications as his girlfriend's son is one of the suspects. His investigative skills and unusual strategies enable him to navigate the complexities of the crimes and personalities to eventually solve the mysteries.

There are many humorous expressions and incidents in the book and it is an easy read. Mr. King is able to deal with the stereotypes regarding First Nations people and their community in a positive way. While the writing style is unique, at times it was difficult to keep all of the characters straight and the plot was somewhat convoluted. Overall our group found the book to be entertaining and it generated a good discussion. We would rate it a 5 out of 10.

Trilogy Book Club

Betty by Tiffany McDaniel

Trilogy members met on March 18th to discuss our selection, *Betty* by Tiffany McDaniel. Thanks go out to Linda Green for hosting and also for her thematic St. Patrick's Day and Easter refreshments! YUM! Without question, *Betty* is a challenging read. Readers are immersed in a narrative that blurs the boundaries between fiction and memoir, offering an intimate glimpse into a family grappling with generational incestuous trauma. Spanning nearly 500 pages, this novel delves deep into the complexities of familial relationships, sexual abuse, racism, poverty, and the profound legacy they leave behind.

At its heart, "*Betty*" revolves around its eponymous protagonist, the second youngest in a family of eight children, four of whom tragically passed away as infants. The story unfolds from the 1950s and subsequent decades, chronicling *Betty*'s family's struggles and triumphs as they navigate the turbulent waters of their existence. *Betty*'s mother, Akla, burdened by the trauma of past sexual abuse from her father, finds solace in a chance encounter with Landon Carpenter, a Cherokee man. Their union becomes a refuge from Akla's painful past, though it is not devoid of challenges. As *Betty* matures amidst racism, poverty, and the loss of siblings, she becomes the custodian of her family's stories, eventually choosing to embark on a journey of self-discovery after graduating from high school, the first in her family to do so.

Throughout the novel, McDaniel's prose shines with poetic descriptions, showcasing *Betty*'s own talents as a writer. Each family member is rendered with depth and complexity, enriching the narrative with their individual stories and struggles. However, despite these strengths, "*Betty*" proves to be a demanding read, with its dense prose and weighty subject matter. While the novel offers a cathartic exploration of the ambiguous nature of dysfunction, it falls short in providing a clear moral or resolution. Additionally, some readers may find the length of the book excessive, feeling that the story could have been effectively conveyed in a shorter format.

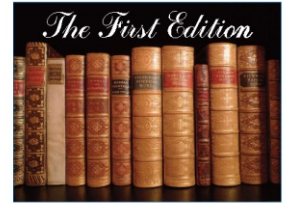
"*Betty*" is a commendable exploration of generational trauma, illuminated by McDaniel's skillful storytelling. However, its challenging nature and length may deter some readers, earning it a moderate rating of 5 or 6 out of 10 and preventing it from receiving Trilogy's full endorsement.

Music Lovers Meet Irving Berlin!

For our first March Zoomer, we listened to the timeless songs of Irving Berlin. Born in Russia in 1888, he arrived in America at age 5. He published his first song, "Marie from Sunny Italy", in 1907, receiving 33 cents for it!

He was known for writing music and lyrics in the American vernacular: simple and direct; songs like: "White Christmas", "Alexander's Ragtime Band", "God Bless America", with his stated aim being to "reach the heart of the average American," whom he saw as the "real soul of the country". During his 60-year career he wrote an estimated 1,500 songs, including the scores for 20 original Broadway shows and 15 original Hollywood films, with his songs nominated eight times for Academy Awards. Berlin died in 1989 at the age of 101.

His best-known musical was "Annie Get Your Gun", based on the real-life characters of Annie Oakley (1860–1926), a sharpshooter who starred in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, and her romance with sharpshooter Frank E. Butler (1847–1926). Jerome Kern had agreed to write the music for "Annie Get Your Gun", but died before he even started. Irving Berlin originally turned down the opportunity to replace Kern, but was persuaded by Oscar Hammerstein to take on the job, writing both words and music. Thank goodness he changed his mind!

Our second March program, called "Hungaria", featured Johannes Brahms' Hungarian Dances and Franz Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsodies. Both Brahms (German) and Liszt (Hungarian) were heavily influenced by Hungarian folk and popular melodies and musical styles (often referred to as "Gypsy" music). The pianist for the Liszt Hungarian Rhapsodies, Gyorgy Cziffra, had been imprisoned by the Hungarian Communist authorities for attempting escape, but was able during the chaos of the 1956 Hungarian Revolution to slip across the border into Austria with his family, for a life in the West. In 1957 I saw him at his first London concert, playing Liszt's piano music – what an experience!

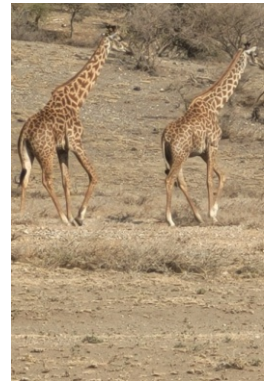
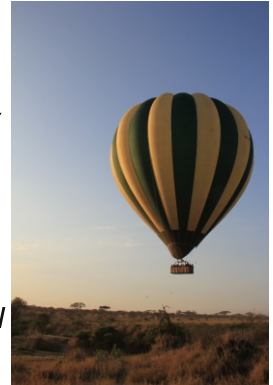

My grandparents immigrated to Tanzania in 1902 as Lutheran missionaries. Back then it was German East Africa, in 1920 it became Tanganyika and in 1964 Tanzania.
